### Executive Summary of issue - Background

Communities throughout North Carolina have begun to place more emphasis on providing facilities for biking and walking. A desire for improved modal choices, the demand for more bikeable and walkable communities and a focus on smart growth initiatives have combined to highlight the need for better, more complete bicycle and pedestrian transportation systems. However, each year, approximately 3,000 pedestrians and 850 bicyclists are hit by cars on North Carolina Streets. Watch for Me NC is a comprehensive program, run by the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) in partnership with local communities, aimed at reducing the number of pedestrians and bicyclists hit and injured in crashes with vehicles.

The City of Shelby was accepted into the Watch for Me Program for 2019. The City also has the ability to continue the program in subsequent years.

The Watch for Me NC program involves two key elements: 1) safety and educational messages directed toward drivers, pedestrians and bicyclists, and 2) high visibility enforcement efforts by area law enforcement to reduce violations of traffic safety laws.

### **Review and Comments**

Since 2007, the City of Shelby has established bicycle lanes on several of its streets and provided space for bicycle lanes on several NCDOT maintained streets. The potential of the rail trail on the current Norfolk-Southern ROW provides a great opportunity to incorporate bicycle facilities into the transportation thread of the community.

Policy 1.7 of the Strategic Growth Plan (2005) supports bicycle and pedestrian safety. "Pedestrian and bikeway facilities shall be encouraged as energy-efficient, healthful, and environmentally sound alternatives to the automobile."

The Watch for Me NC program is also consistent with the policies and recommendations found in the Comprehensive Pedestrian Plan as well as the Comprehensive Land Use Plan. I believe a special presentation to City Council would be helpful in understanding the program. The Kick Off Event is scheduled for August 6<sup>th</sup> at the National Night Out at the City Pavilion. Staff has recently attended Watch for Me Workshops on Law Enforcement Operations and Action Planning.

Please schedule a special presentation on the agenda for the August 5, 2019 City Council meeting.

Alan Toney, the City's Long Range Planner, will be making this presentation.

Mayor Anthony called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and welcomed all who were in attendance. The Mayor gave the invocation and Mr. Hendrick led the *Pledge of Allegiance*.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. White, City Council voted unanimously to approve the agenda as presented.

- **B. Public Comment: None**
- C. Second Reading:
  - 1) Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina: Ordinance No. 42-2019

Mayor Anthony summarized this proposed zoning map amendment for the property located at 2324 Kings Road Extension, which passed by Council's vote of 3 to 2 on June 17, 2019. However, according to North Carolina General Statute 160A-75, no ordinance nor any action having the effect of any ordinance may be finally adopted on the date on which it is introduced except by an affirmative vote equal to or greater than two-thirds of the actual membership of the Council. An ordinance shall be deemed to have been

introduced on the date the subject matter is first voted on by Council. Therefore, this ordinance must be approved by Council at a second reading before it may take effect. Accordingly, approval of this ordinance now only requires a simple majority of the members present for adoption.

Mr. Hendrick requested to be excused from voting on this rezoning matter due to his financial interest in the subject property. Mr. Yelton advised the matter involves a legislative land use matter and the standard is a board member shall not vote where the outcome of the matter is reasonably likely to have a direct, substantial, and readily identifiable financial impact.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. Causby, City Council voted unanimously to excuse Mr. Hendrick from voting on Ordinance No. 42-2019.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. White, City Council voted unanimously to approve and adopt Ordinance No. 42-2019 entitled, "A PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA".

### D. Public Hearings:

1) Consideration of the City of Shelby's submittal of a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) application to the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality (NCDEQ) Division of Water Infrastructure (DWI)

Mayor Anthony introduced the matter and the public hearing as a requirement of the CDBG application process.

Mr. Scharer stated the North Carolina Department of Commerce has notified local communities of the latest round of CDBG funding assistance for infrastructure. He further stated the City of Shelby may be eligible for CDBG funds for sewer improvements. The hearing allows the public to provide input on projects to be considered by City Council. City staff will give this input consideration and review prior to a specific project recommendation. Should the City choose to apply for any CDBG funds, a second public hearing will be held directly concerning that specific project and application.

Mayor Anthony opened the public hearing at 6:06 p.m. and invited comments from the public:

Rev. James Williams who resides at 1410 Vantage Drive in Shelby, North Carolina spoke in support of the City's CDBG grant application. Rev. Williams was pleased to hear the promising news that sometime in the future there is a possibility of sewer service being provided to the Clearbrook

subdivision with its failing septic systems.

Rev. Frankie Smith who resides at 303 East Ross Grove Road in Shelby, North Carolina also spoke in support of the City's CDBG grant application. Rev. Smith was appreciative for the City's consideration of a project to bring sewer service to the long-time residents of Clearbrook subdivision.

Mayor Anthony closed the public hearing at 6:09 p.m.

Council received the information and no action was required at this time.

2) Consideration of a proposed ordinance to amend the Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) of the City of Shelby: Ordinance No. 45-2019

Mr. Scharer introduced the proposed textual amendment to the City's UDO for landscaping and horticultural services. He stated that currently the City's UDO permits landscaping and horticultural services as a use by right with no development standards in General Business (GB) and General Business 2 (GB2) zoning districts. The proposal permits landscaping and horticultural services with development standards in the Corridor Protection Zoning District. These development standards include requirements for setbacks and screening requirements.

Mr. Scharer explained the Corridor Protection District (CPD) has as its major objectives to promote sensitive conversion of vacant land to more urban uses; support development that is compatible with and enhance the visual attractiveness of the area; promote well-planned, economically viable development; ensure safe and efficient traffic flow; and avoid uncoordinated, strip development patterns.

Mr. Scharer concluded by stating the Planning and Zoning Board has reviewed this proposal and recommended the ordinance as proposed.

Mayor Anthony opened the public hearing at 6:11 p.m. and invited comments from the public.

The public offered no comments. Mayor Anthony closed the public hearing at 6:12 p.m.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. White, City Council voted unanimously to approve and adopt Ordinance No. 45-2019 entitled, "A PROPOSED ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE UNIFIED DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SHELBY".

3) Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina: Ordinance No. 46-2019

Mr. Scharer introduced this zoning map amendment for properties located at 410 Cherryville Road from Residential 20 (R20) zoning district to the Corridor Protection District (CPD). Utilizing a location map, a zoning map, a local future land use map, and an area future land use map, he pointed to the site currently adjacent to the Paradise Garden Center. The Shelby Comprehensive Land Use Plan designates this area as Medium Density Residential. Mr. Scharer stated the proposed zoning map amendment is inconsistent with Comprehensive Land Use Plan. However, the proposed zoning map amendment is consistent with the development patterns in the area as land uses include single-family dwellings, professional services, and institutional uses.

Mr. Scharer concluded by stating the Planning and Zoning Board recommended approval of the proposed zoning map amendment for the property located at 410 Cherryville Road from Residential 20 (R20) zoning district to Corridor Protection District (CPD).

Mayor Anthony opened the public hearing at 6:14 p.m. and invited comments from the public:

Michael Harden who owns the business, Paradise Garden Center, located at 460 Cherryville Road in Shelby, North Carolina spoke in support of the application requesting the zoning map amendment at 410 Cherryville Road.

Mayor Anthony closed the public hearing at 6:15 p.m.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. White, City Council voted unanimously to approve and adopt Ordinance No. 46-2019 entitled, "A PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA".

  - 1) Consideration of a resolution supporting the City of Shelby's application for the North Carolina Department of Transportation Transportation Alternatives Program Fund Grant: Resolution No. 47-2019

Mr. Howell introduced Resolution No. 47-2019 for Council's consideration. If approved, this resolution would authorize the City to submit a grant

application to the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) through the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP). The purpose of NCDOT-TAP is to provide funding for non-traditional transportation projects. Mr. Howell stated \$15 million has been allocated from the TAP Program to secure and improve rail corridors for Rails to Trails projects statewide. Staff is proposing to apply for these funds to assist in the acquisition of the Norfolk Southern Rail Corridor for the proposed Rail Trail in Shelby. The maximum grant amount is not yet determined and there is a minimum 20 percent match to this grant.

Mr. Howell recommended Council's approval of the resolution authorizing an application for a NCDOT-TAP Rails to Trails grant.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. Webber, City Council voted unanimously to approve and adopt Resolution No. 47-2019 entitled, "A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE CITY OF SHELBY'S APPLICATION FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION – TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM FUND GRANT".

2) Consideration of a resolution awarding the contract for the City of Shelby Stormwater Infrastructure Assistance Program Project at 422 Carolina Avenue in Shelby, North Carolina: Resolution No. 48-2019

Mr. Howell introduced Resolution No. 48-2019 for Council's consideration. If approved, this resolution would award a contract in the amount of \$67,012.00 to Morrison Construction Co., Inc. for the construction of stormwater system improvements at 422 Carolina Avenue. The applicant is Mt. Calvary Baptist Church.

As a reminder, Mr. Howell explained this project qualifies for assistance through the City's Stormwater Infrastructure Assistance Policy which states that for assistance on commercial properties, the City will be responsible for 50 percent of the construction cost (\$33,506.00) and the property owner will be responsible for the remaining 50 percent (\$33,506.00) via a legal agreement. Funding for the City's portion of the construction contract is available in the existing Stormwater Utility budget.

Mr. Howell recommended City Council approve the resolution awarding the bid for the Stormwater Infrastructure Assistance Program project located at 422 Carolina Avenue to the lowest responsive bidder, Morrison Construction Co., Inc. of Shelby, North Carolina , for the bid price of \$67,012.00.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mrs. Arth Dukes, City Council voted unanimously to approve and adopt Resolution No. 48-2019 entitled, "A RESOLUTION AWARDING THE CONTRACT FOR THE CITY OF SHELBY

STORMWATER INFRASTRUCTURE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM PROJECT AT 422 CAROLINA AVENUE IN SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA".

3) Consideration of a resolution awarding the contract for the City of Shelby Stormwater Infrastructure Assistance Program Project at 200 West Warren Street in Shelby, North Carolina: Resolution No. 49-2019

Mr. Howell introduced Resolution No. 49-2019 for Council's consideration. If approved, this resolution would award a contract in the amount of \$82,390.00 to Clark Ledbetter Grading for the construction of stormwater system improvements at 200 West Warren Street. The applicant is Carl Cato, owner of Farmers Market Condominiums.

As a reminder, Mr. Howell explained this project qualifies for assistance through the City's Stormwater Infrastructure Assistance Policy which states that for assistance on commercial properties, the City will be responsible for 50 percent of the construction cost (\$41,195.00) and the property owner will be responsible for the remaining 50 percent (\$41,195.00) via a legal agreement. Funding for the City's portion of the construction contract is available in the existing Stormwater Utility budget.

Mr. Howell recommended City Council approve the resolution awarding the bid for the Stormwater Infrastructure Assistance Program project located at 200 West Warren Street to the lowest responsive bidder, Clark Ledbetter Grading, Inc. of Shelby, North Carolina, for the bid price of \$82,390.00.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. Causby, City Council voted unanimously to approve and adopt Resolution No. 49-2019 entitled, "A RESOLUTION AWARDING THE CONTRACT FOR THE CITY OF SHELBY STORMWATER INFRASTRUCTURE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM PROJECT AT 200 WEST WARREN STREET IN SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA".

### H. City Manager's Report:

- 1) With regard to the expansion of Greenheck Fan Corporation within the Foothills Commerce Center representing a total investment of \$59 million and more than 400 jobs, Mr. Howell reported the project is moving forward and their plans are consistent with the development agreement between the City of Shelby and the company.
- 2) Mr. Howell mentioned the process regarding the Airport Layout Plan, which is the master planning document for the Shelby-Cleveland County Regional Airport, will begin in the very near future. The City has secured a grant in the amount of \$225,000 from the North Carolina Division of Aviation for this project. The local match for this grant is \$25,000.

- 3) With regard to the future construction of the next shell building, which will be the third joint venture by Cleveland County and the City of Shelby, Mr. Howell suggested either Cleveland County's 47-acre site on Plato Lee Road or the City's 64-acre site on Randolph Road as the possible locations under consideration.
- 4) Mr. Howell announced a portion of South Washington Street will be paved beginning in late August 2019.
- 5) Mr. Howell mentioned several utility relocation projects are in progress as a result of the North Carolina Department of Transportation projects currently underway including the US 74 Bypass and the Marion Street/Peach Street/Cherryville Road intersection.
  - He also mentioned the City is evaluating several proposals for a Natural Gas System Assessment which will be brought to Council as a future agenda item.
- 6) Mr. Howell provided an update on the T-Hangar Project at the Shelby-Cleveland County Regional Airport, which is moving along very well.
- 7) Mr. Howell stated the Farmville Road elevated storage water tank near Clearwater Paper Corporation is still on schedule to be operational in September 2019.
- 8) Mr. Howell also stated the First Broad River Wastewater Treatment Plant Bio-solids Improvement Project continues to move forward.
- 9) Mr. Howell provided a progress report regarding the Water Treatment Plant Upgrades Project which is ongoing as the new 2.5 million gallon clear wells are taking shape.
- 10) Mr. Howell said the next phase of the Uptown Shelby Streetscaping Project will begin on August 19, 2019.
- I. Council Announcements and Remarks:
  - 1) Mayor Anthony expressed his appreciation to City staff for hosting the fireworks show and display at the Shelby City Park Sports Complex on July 5, 2019, hoping this will become the start of a new tradition for the City.
  - 2) Mr. White expressed his appreciation to Mr. Howell and City staff for bringing several minimum housing demolitions to City Council for action.

3) Mrs. Arth Dukes said she walked to Shelby City Park to attend the fireworks show on July 5, 2019, which was thoroughly enjoyed by all in her party. She added the best view and the best seats were on the baseball field. Mrs. Arth Dukes was pleased the fireworks were brought back by the City and hopes the traffic issues can be resolved in the future.

### City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Ordinance No. 54-2019 is presented for Council consideration at this time. This is the final budget amendment for fiscal year 2018-19 which will close June 30. These are final budget adjustments of previously authorized Council expenditures to ensure that the audited financial statements reflect a balanced budget as required by statute.

In accordance with the Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act (LGBFCA), the annual budget document for each fiscal year ending June 30 must meet the balanced budget and inclusiveness requirements. The inclusiveness requirements mean the City may only spend moneys that have been budgeted [G.S. 159-8(a)]. The balanced budget requirement means that any budget ordinance, project ordinance, financial plan, or internal service fund must balance. General Statute 159-8(a) defines a balanced budget as "the sum of estimated net revenues and appropriated fund balances is equal to the appropriations."

It is recommended that Ordinance No. 54-2019 be adopted by City Council at this time via the Consent Agenda.

### City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Please note that the Building Inspector has duly conducted enforcement of the minimum housing code in accordance with the NC General Statutes and City Code. I do want to emphasize that it is the common practice of the City to err on the side of the property owner in most all cases giving them the benefit of the doubt when action is initiated. A thorough and fair due process is followed in all cases. Demolition of these homes is always the last resort after efforts to persuade a property owner to make these minimum standards have failed. As you all know once this ordinance is passed the City is empowered to enter onto the property to demolish the building. All associated demolition costs and administrative costs are then filed by the City Attorney as a lien against the property. This lien is normally only satisfied to the City's benefit upon the sale of the property.

**POLICY 4.4:** Vacant and abandoned sites and buildings shall be properly cared for or removed, thereby preventing a blighting impact on the area in which they are located.

### Executive Summary of issue - Background

These buildings associated with this proposed demolition action are in a dilapidated condition and have been vacant and abandoned for nearly 12 years. Initial complaints came from residents, the Shelby Police Department and City Code Enforcement. The property owner has been given due process and has failed to comply with the City's Building Code.

### **Review and Comments**

Due to dilapidation these buildings are unfit for human habitation and have the potential of increasing the hazards of fire, accident, and other calamities; it is dangerous and detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the City of Shelby. The estimated cost of demolition and removal is approximately \$25,000.00. Budgeted minimum housing funds will be used for this demotion.

Removal of this structure complies with the North Carolina Building Code and NC General Statutes.

The following Strategic Growth Plan Policies and Actions support removal of this structure.

POLICY 4.4: Vacant and abandoned sites and buildings shall be properly cared for or removed, thereby preventing a blighting impact on the area in which they are located.














# Location Map 317, 319, & 321 Lineberger Street

**WHEREAS**, the said structures remain at this time unfit for human habitation, dilapidated, and a danger to the health and safety of the citizens of the City of Shelby, and should be removed by demolition in order to prevent and alleviate such continuing danger and dilapidated conditions.

### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA:

**Section 1**. The structures on the property known as 315, 317, 319, and 321 Lineberger Street, Shelby, and described in the Cleveland County records as Tax Parcel No. 18748 be demolished forthwith, the remnants thereof disposed, and a lien for the costs of such demolition and removal, less any credits due the owner(s), be filed against the property and collected pursuant to the provisions of North Carolina General Statutes § 160A-432, et seq.; and,

**Section 2**. Said lien shall bear interest until paid, as allowed in Article 10 of Chapter 160A of the N.C. General Statutes, at the rate of eight percent (8.0%) per annum.

Section 2. The City Clerk is hereby directed to publish this Resolution of Intent once a week for four (4) successive weeks prior to the public hearing in *The Shelby Star*.

Section 3. The City Clerk is further directed to transmit by certified mail, return receipt requested, to each owner of property abutting on said street a copy of this Resolution of Intent and shall cause a notice of the Public Hearing to be prominently posted in at least two places along the subject street.

Section 4. This Resolution of Intent shall become effective upon its adoption and approval.



Upon the advice of the City Attorney and in consultation with the School of Government Resolution No. 52-2019 is presented for City Council consideration at this time. It is presented separately from Resolution 50-2019 to remove any perception or real conflict of interest. As you all know Councilmember Violet Arth Dukes is an employee of the Cleveland County Arts Council and as such it could be perceived that she has a conflict of interest when voting on this matter given it awards her employer a grant. This could be considered or perceived by some that Councilmember Arth Dukes is receiving a prohibited "direct benefit" from the City if she were to vote. As such it is up to a member of Council to request recusal and for Council to grant that recusal.

I have reviewed the applications submitted by the eligible organizations for travel and tourism grant funding. Each year past grant recipients and other organizations that have expressed an interest are eligible to submit grant applications for these funds generated through the 3% room occupancy tax levied by City Council. Each is reviewed to determine if the purpose for use of funds is eligible under the statutes and city policy, the economic impact of the event(s), past use of funds, success of past events, financial participation by the entity, as well as other relevant criteria. Resolution No. 52-2018 is presented for consideration at this time.

It is my recommendation that Resolution No. 52-2018 be adopted and approved by City Council at this time.

#### City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Resolution Nos. 53-2019 and 54-2019 are presented for City Council consideration as new business. As noted in a memo from Mr. Hux the water and sewer lines currently serving this neighborhood have largely outlived their useful life. The City has experienced significant issues with service over the years. City staff believes that replacement and repair of these water and sewer lines is not only necessary to continue to serve existing City customers but also is a must if any new construction or development is to occur. As you know Carolina Community Developers, LLC has purchased the old Ella Mill site as well as a significant number of lots surrounding the site. They have been approved by the NC Housing Finance Agency for funding to construct up to 96 new units (apartments and duplexes) on those properties. In addition this same group has applied for funding for an additional 48 units (duplexes) in the area. They actually own these properties or have options on them. Without these water and sewer improvements this development cannot occur. Estimated investment by the developer is approximately \$8 million when all is said and done. This project also provides high quality affordable housing for low to moderate income persons in our community. These projects are funded within the operating budget of the Water Resources Department for fiscal year 2019-2020.

It is my recommendation that Resolution Nos. 53-2019 and 54-2019 be approved by City Council at this time.

#### Background

The Ella Mill property and a number of homes located around S Morgan and Textile have been purchased by a developer with the intent to build new houses, duplexes, and apartments.

The water system in this area dates back to the early 1940's and has lines that cross private property, broken valves and has some hydrants with minimal fire flow protection. The sewer system in this area dates back to the early 1900's and was initially installed by the mill. Most of the sewer lines are small and have structural defects requiring replacement.

#### Review

The City of Shelby staff has reviewed the existing conditions in the area and has also met with the developer to review layouts and utility connections. Water connections will be paid for by the developer and some of the sewer will have to be re-laid in some areas by the developer to accommodate development plans.

Odom Engineer provided water and sewer improvements design for the City's portion of this project. The waterlines on South Morgan and Ella would be replaced due to age and lower fire flow. This work also allows us to remove an old line that crosses private property and crosses under the railroad.

The sewer line running from Morgan across Wooden and Church Streets will be replaced due to small size and structural integrity. This line will also be relocated to allow adequate access for City crews after redevelopment.

Plans were developed and bids were taken for the project. The City received five (5) bids for the Ella Street Sewer & Water Repair/Replacement on June 21, 2019.

The water rehabilitation/replacement portion was bid with three (3) different options. The City has decided to complete two (2) of the options at this time. The lowest combined bid for the two (2) water options selected was submitted by Marvin Hoyle Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$195,783.50.

The lowest bid for the sewer rehabilitation/replacement portion was submitted by Kennedy Concrete & Utilities, Inc. in the amount of \$153,901.00.

#### Recommendation

City Staff has reviewed the bids and recommends that the City Council approve the resolutions, awarding the bid for the Ella Street Water Repair/Replacement to the lowest bidder, Marvin Hoyle Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$195,783.50 and Ella Street Sewer Repair/Replacement to the lowest bidder, Kennedy Concrete & Utilities Inc. in the amount of \$153,901.00. Funds are budgeted in the water and sewer budgets for FY2019/2020.
