Sunset Cemetery Project Presentation

City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

In early 2021 it was brought to my attention by City staff that a local group of citizens had taken interest in a section of Sunset Cemetery that they believed might contain the unmarked graves of African Americans. This section has for many years been somewhat of a mystery as it contains no markers but had been routinely mowed and maintained by the City as part of the cemetery. This local citizen group sought approval to undertake an effort to better determine the history of the site and to verify if the unmarked area contained remains. I granted them approval at that time and informed Council of the effort.

The attached presentation lays out an overview of the project, its purpose, a set of desired outcomes and a proposal from the local group regarding this section of Sunset Cemetery. Once complete no action is necessary at this point. If Council wishes to allow the effort to proceed then I would recommend that drafting of a specific resolution that clearly defines what may be approving and setting forth the terms of how Council would like it carried out. I can have this resolution ready for your consideration at the November 21, 2022 regular meeting.

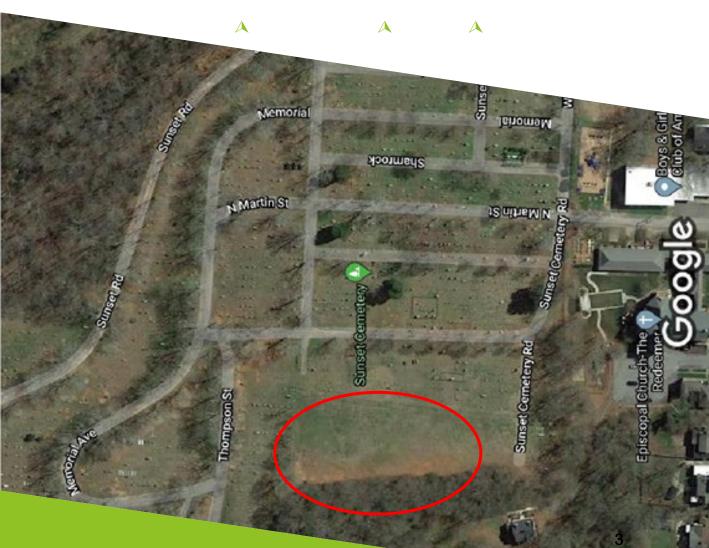


Brief overview Project

Sunset Cemetery, which has served as Shelby's most prominent cemetery for nearly 200 years, has an unmarked section with graves of African Americans that date back to at least 1876.

This section lies on the western side of the old section of the cemetery and is currently a large open grassy field.

A committee of concerned citizens was formed in January of 2021 with the express purpose of investigating the site and working through options for raising awareness of its historical and cultural value.

Mayor pro tem Hopper called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Mr. Webber delivered the invocation and Mr. Causby led the Pledge of Allegiance.

A. Approval of agenda:

Mayor pro tem Hopper requested the addition of Resolution No. 66-2022 be added as Item C-4 under Consent Items.

1) Motion to adopt the amended agenda

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion by Ms. Arth, City Council voted unanimously to approve the agenda as amended.

B. Public Comment:

Debbie Chaffin who resides at 101 Victoria Park Drive, Shelby, North Carolina presented to City Council three safety concerns that she and her neighbors have that live in the Magnolia Plantation subdivision:

- The proposed new cut thru from Kings Road to the service road many residents have lived in the neighborhood when there was a cut thru to the service road and when there was not; they prefer not having a cut thru to the service road.
- The construction of a new hotel to the right of the proposed new cut through the residents are not concerned about the actual hotel

- being built but worry about strangers that walk thru their neighborhood from the hotels.
- The addition of a proposed subdivision to the left and rear of Magnolia Plantation with plans for 138 homes – the residents are very concerned about the increase in traffic and are worried about the safety due to only one way in and one way out of the neighborhood.

Ms. Chaffin distributed a handout for City Council which contains more details and data on the three safety concerns she spoke about. She thanked Council for their time and thanked the City staff she spoke to for being so helpful.

Cora Peeler who resides at 2037 Green Oak Drive, Shelby, North Carolina distributed a handout to Council which is a petition signed by over 40 residents of the Hickory Hill community. Ms. Peeler stated that the people in the Hickory Hill community are joining together to petition that the Hickory Hill community will never be zoned again; or will never again have two separate houses built on a single lot as long as these residents are homeowners in this neighborhood. Ms. Peeler continued by stating that Council should have investigated the new proposed home structures and whether they compare to the other homes in the neighborhood. Ms. Peeler also questioned the lack of zoning notification that the neighborhood received; saying the sign placed in the yard wasn't very noticeable and only two families received a notification in the mail. Ms. Peeler suggested the rezoning notification could have been mailed with the utility bill that the residents receive each month. Ms. Peeler concluded by stating the residents of Hickory Hill take pride in their community and stated, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

C. Public Hearing:

1) Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina at Gilliatt Street and East Marion Street: Ordinance No. 55-2022

Mr. Scharer introduced a zoning map amendment for property located at Gilliatt Street and East Marion Street from R10 zoning district to General Business (GB) zoning district. Mr. Scharer listed the various commercial uses on this section of East Marion Street which include a produce stand, butcher shop, coffee shop, a laundromat and a self-storage facility. According to Mr. Scharer this particular property is surrounded by General Business and Residential zoning districts. Mr. Scharer concluded by stating the Planning and Zoning Board recommended the proposed zoning amendment due to the development patterns in the area.

Mayor pro tem Hopper opened the public hearing at 6:19 p.m. and invited comments from the public.

Don Peeler who resides at 101 Apple Hill Drive, Shelby, North Carolina spoke as the applicant and in favor of the zoning amendment. Mr. Peeler stated the property owner, Cecil Lee Gilliatt, Jr., desires to have medium to upscale apartments built on the property. Mr. Peeler explained the General Business zoning district works best for this property because of the density required and for a better layout of the proposed apartments. Mr. Peeler stated his hope is to have an apartment complex similar to Crystal Springs that he developed a few years ago. Mr. Peeler stated he doesn't know how many apartments will fit on the property, but they will be all brick.

Mayor pro tem Hopper closed the public hearing at 6:24 p.m.

Mr. Howell reminded Council that in their decision-making they must consider that amending this property to General Business zoning district allows any business use permitted under the General Business classification in the future.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. White, City Council voted unanimously to approve Ordinance No. 55-2022 entitled, "A PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA AT GILLIATT STREET AND EAST MARION STREET."

- Regarding Shell Building #4: Wall panels are up, and the roofing system should be going in this week.
- Regarding Rail Trail: Continuing to work with NC DOT on the \$4.16 million grant awarded a few years ago to help construct a portion of the Rail Trail. This is federal grant money that must be used for that specific purpose.
- Regarding Water and Sewer projects: The City identified projects for the \$400,000 American Rescue Plan grant for analysis of the aging parts of the Water and Sewer systems. Mr. Hux is working with the State and moving those projects along.

H. Council Announcements and Remarks:

Ms. Arth asked Mr. Howell to make sure someone follows up with the residents of the Hickory Hill community to see why they were not better notified of the rezoning last month. Ms. Arth also commented that her boyfriend won the Livermush Cook-off on Saturday.

Mr. White was glad to see so many people in Shelby on Saturday with all the events that were taking place.

Mr. Causby thoroughly enjoyed going Uptown Saturday with his grandchildren on Saturday.

Mr. Webber reiterated what Ms. Arth said about City staff reaching out to the citizens of Hickory Hill and address their concerns. Mr. Webber attended the 100-year celebration for Enloe Mortuary on Saturday. Apparently, Enloe

Mortuary is one of sixteen businesses in the country that are still in operation after 100 years.

Mayor pro tem Hopper also stated it was a busy weekend in Shelby and it was great to see so many people in town. Mr. Hopper also attended the Enloe Mortuary celebration. Mr. Hopper mentioned Pink Bell has worked at the funeral home for 67 years – he started as a teenager. Mr. Hopper had a conversation with Bobby Bell, and he extended his appreciation to the City of Shelby for their condolences when his wife passed away earlier this year. Enloe Mortuary staff truly appreciated City Council for presenting to them the key to the City in honor of their 100th anniversary. Mr. Hopper stated the mortuary also had a well-attended Health Fair, which was a festive occasion for them to host. Mr. Hopper wanted to publicly thank Chip Nuhrah for his work on Saturday coordinating and producing the Enloe Mortuary anniversary event. Mr. Hopper also thanked the Police and Fire chiefs for their support and work over the weekend.

City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

These events are in keeping with special event practices of the City. It is my recommendation that this item be approved by City Council at this time via the Consent Agenda.

I do want to make Council aware that after the first of the year I will be proposing a revised special event ordinance that formalizes the City's process and more clearly spells out the City's expectations of those submitting applications that require additional City services including the closure of streets and sidewalks. Special events require a great deal of resources often including employee work hours (Public Works, Police, Fire & Rescue and Parks and Recreation) as well as equipment. These events which provide important activities for citizens/visitors do require staff to divert from their usual duties even if only for a brief period in some cases. As you have heard me say each employee is budgeted for 2,080 hours per year. Each hour committed to special events takes away from the core purpose of that employee. I am not suggesting that the City no longer allow special events but do believe a more clear and formal policy will assist in helping us to manage our resources. Look for a recommendation in early 2023.

City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Ordinance No. 58-2022 is presented for City Council consideration via the Consent Agenda. Council will recall that I discussed the possibility of awarding employees a one-time bonus toward the end of the calendar year. This budget amendment, if approved, would authorize the shifting of funds within each operating fund for that purpose. Bonuses would be awarded in the amount of \$2,000.00 for each current full-time employee with a pro rata amount not to exceed \$500.00 to regular part time employees. Bonuses would likely be paid out in early December of this year. I do wish to note that this amendment **does not increase** the overall budget but merely uses already budgeted but unspent 'salary and wage' appropriations which have resulted from vacancies in each operating fund. This is illustrated in Section 2 of the ordinance. The total cost of the bonuses proposed is \$626,500 across all funds. (General Fund \$480,500; Sewer Fund \$42,000; Natural Gas Fund \$36,000; Water Fund \$30,000; Electric Fund \$18,000; Housing Fund \$16,000 and Stormwater Fund \$4,000.)

It is therefore my recommendation that Ordinance No. 58-2022 be adopted and approved by City Council via the Consent Agenda.

City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Resolution No.67-2022 is presented for City Council consideration via the Consent Agenda. If approved this resolution would simply extend the current audit contract from the usual 10/31/2022 to 12/31/2022. This extension is largely a formality. It has already been cleared through the NC Local Government Commission staff at the State Treasurer's Office. This is a necessary step prior to it coming to City Council.

The reason for the extension largely lies on the fact that the City Accounting Division experienced significant staff turnover during the audit process resulting in some delayed capital asset reporting. The division experienced 2 retirements and a resignation because of an out of state relocation. As of the end of November this division will be fully staff. Beth Beam, Finance Director, is to be commended for her excellent work in financial reporting and this delay is in no way a reflection on her management of the department. She has continued to carry on the good work of Mr. Merritt and past Finance Directors.

The presentation of the annual audit is still scheduled for your regular meeting of December 5, 2022.

It is therefore my recommendation that Resolution No. 67-2022 be adopted and approved by City Council at this time via the Consent Agenda.

Background:

North Carolina State Statutes require that all municipal governments publish a complete set of financial statements presented in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards by a firm of licensed certified public accountants. The NC Local Government Commission requires that all municipal governments contract with an independent audit firm, on an annual basis, to meet these requirements.

Review:

During the course of the final audit preparation, it has become necessary to modify the due date of the report from 10/31/2022 to 12/31/2022. There are several contributing factors to the modification. The City has had major staff turnover in the Accounting division during the year – 2 retirements and 1 relocation. The Capital Asset reporting module in the financial software also failed to calculate depreciation for FY22 and FY21 new acquisitions. GASB 87 also required a new reporting of all City leases. All reporting issues have now been resolved and the report is currently being drafted.

Recommendation:

That City Council authorize the Mayor to execute the required contract amendment with Martin Starnes & Associates for the FY 2022 audit to modify the contract from a due date of 10/31/2022 to 12/31/2022.

City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Please note that the Chief Code Enforcement Officer in consultation with the Building Inspector has duly conducted enforcement of the minimum housing code in accordance with the NC General Statutes and City Code. I do want to emphasize that it is the common practice of the City to err on the side of the property owner in most all cases giving them the benefit of the doubt when action is initiated. A thorough and fair due process is followed in all cases. Demolition of these homes is always the last resort after efforts to persuade a property owner to make these minimum standards have failed. As you all know once this ordinance is passed the City is empowered to enter onto the property to demolish the building. All associated demolition costs and administrative costs are then filed by the City Attorney as a lien against the property. This lien is normally only satisfied to the City's benefit upon the sale of the property.

Executive Summary of issue - Background

The dwelling associated with this proposed demolition action is in a dilapidated condition and should be removed for the safety of the citizens of Shelby. Initial complaints came from residents, the Shelby Police Department and City Code Enforcement. The property owner has been given due process and has failed to comply with the City's Minimum Housing Code.

Review and Comments

Due to dilapidation, this dwelling is unfit for human habitation and has the potential of increasing the hazards of fire, accident, and other calamities; it is dangerous and detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the City of Shelby. The estimated cost of demolition and removal is approximately \$5,000.00. Budgeted minimum housing funds will be used for this demotion.

Removal of this structure is in compliance with the City of Shelby Minimum Housing Code pursuant to N.C.G.S. 160A-441.

Removal of this structure is supported by the following Strategic Growth Plan Policies and Actions:

POLICY 4.4: Vacant and abandoned sites and buildings shall be properly cared for or removed, thereby preventing a blighting impact on the area in which they are located.

Action 4.4.1: Examine and implement standards for maintaining undeveloped or vacant lots and for repairing or removing abandoned structures and sites.

POLICY 9.2: Consistent, reliable enforcement of well written housing and nuisance abatement codes shall be employed to eliminate instances of unlawful activity and urban blight within the planning area of Shelby.

Recommendation

Please place this item on the consent agenda for the next City Council meeting on November 7, 2022. Staff recommends this minimum housing action.

ORDINANCE NO. 59 - 2022

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING DEMOLITION OF A DWELLING AT 501 WEST GRAHAM STREET

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 160D, Article 12, of the North Carolina General Statutes, the double family dwelling located at 501 WEST GRAHAM STREET Shelby, North Carolina, has been inspected and found to be unfit for human habitation and to otherwise constitute a danger to persons and a threat to the health and welfare of the citizens within the City; and,

WHEREAS, according to the procedure provided by law, the owner(s) of said property, <u>HAMMOND</u> <u>LEDGE SOUTH, LLC</u> has or have been given notice of the aforesaid inspection, determination, and orders to bring said property into compliance with the housing standards of the City of Shelby by appropriate repair or removal of said dwelling; and,

WHEREAS, the owner(s) have first been given a reasonable opportunity to bring it into conformity with the housing code; and

WHEREAS, no action of any kind has been taken or initiated by the owner(s), or any party on behalf of said owner(s), to achieve compliance with said ordinances within the periods allowed by law; and,

WHEREAS, the said dwelling remains at this time unfit for human habitation, dilapidated, and a danger to the health and safety of the citizens of the City of Shelby, and should be removed by demolition to prevent and alleviate such continuing danger and dilapidated conditions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA:

Section 1. The dwellings on the property known as <u>501 WEST GRAHAM STREET</u>, Shelby, and described in the Cleveland County records as <u>Tax Parcel Number 71508</u> be demolished forthwith, the remnants thereof disposed, and a lien for the costs of such demolition and removal, less any credits due the owner(s), be filed against the property and collected pursuant to the provisions of North Carolina General Statutes § 160D-1203, et seq.; and,

Section 2. Said lien bear interest until paid, as allowed in Article 12 of Chapter 160D of the N.C. General Statutes, at the rate of eight percent (8.0%) per annum.

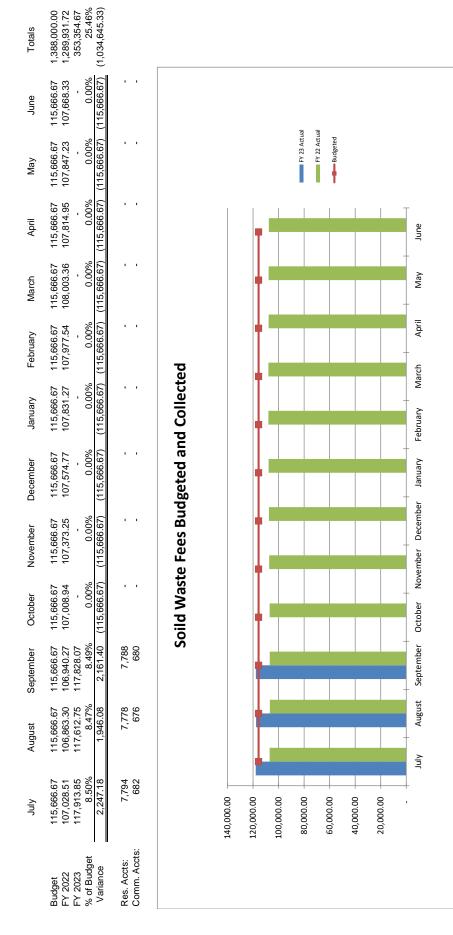

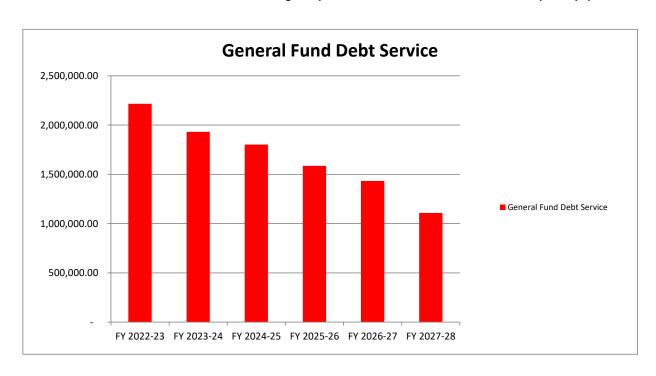
City of Shelby Solid Waste Fees FY 2023

City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Resolution No. 68-2022 is presented for City Council consideration at this time. If approved this resolution would approve the included funding allocation plan for use of the \$10.2 million appropriated specifically to the City of Shelby within the recently adopted state budget (S.L. 2022-74). Section 12.9.(e) specifically states that "Projects, - Of the funds allocated by subsection (a) of this section for project grants, the following sums shall be granted to the indicated local governments and public entities for water and wastewater infrastructure projects;......(75) Ten million two hundred thousand dollars (10,200,000) to the City of Shelby."

This resolution, if approved, would formally allocate these funds for water and wastewater projects recommended by the Water Resources Department. The intent of the resolution is to ensure that City Council is fully informed as to the proposed specific use of these funds and the reasoning behind the recommendation. I will cover this in more detail on Monday evening.

It is therefore my recommendation that Resolution No. 68-2022 be adopted and approved at this time.

BACKGROUND/REVIEW

Through Session Law 2022-74, the City of Shelby has been appropriated \$10,200,000 for water and wastewater infrastructure projects. Based on the guidance for these funds, City Staff has reviewed infrastructure needs and developed a list of justified projects that meet the submittal and project completion deadlines. Construction projects utilizing this funding are required to be completed by December 31, 2026.

Below is a summary of the projects that are anticipated to utilize this funding:

24" Waterline to South Tank and Forest Hills Drive - \$2,000,300

- o \$7,700,300 (Total Project Cost)
- o \$5,700,000 from previous 2021-2022 State Appropriation

Provides the balance of funding necessary to construct approximately 12,000 linear feet of 24" Waterline from the Marion St./Morgan St. intersection to the South Tank and Forest Hill Dr. via Morgan St., Graham St. and Washington St.

Hickory Creek Sewer Windsor to Holly Oak - \$2,105,000

- o \$3,805,000 (Total Project Cost)
- o \$1,700,000 from previous 2021-2022 State Appropriation

Provides the balance of funding necessary for replacement of approximately 4,800 linear feet of 18" - 24" sewer line from Windsor Drive to US74 and a section south of Earl Road around Holly Oak Park.

Water Treatment Plant Filter Rehabilitation - \$2,500,000

Filter rehabilitation of eight filters. Project also provides repair/replacement of sedimentation basin valves. This project is currently being designed for bid and should be ready for bid in January 2023.

Water/Sewer System Improvements to Promote Residential Development - \$2,000,000

This funding will be used for the extension of water and sewer service for residential development on parcels that lie outside the current service area. Developers would still be required to install water and sewer infrastructure within the new development.

Water and Sewer System Repairs and Maintenance - \$1,594,700

Water and Sewer System point repairs.

Background

In February 2022, LGI Homes received its approval for the development of a major subdivision on Pinnacle Crossing and Joe's Lake Road in the City of Shelby. This project consists of 25.3 acres and will result in the construction of 92 single family homes. After receiving approval for the project, the developer proceeded with the site work and infrastructure that is required. Currently, the sewer system, grading, curb and gutter, and stormwater system have been completed. They are in the process of installing the water system and plan to pave the streets in the next few weeks.

For this subdivision, the City of Shelby will provide water, sewer, and electric utility service. Per City policy, the developer is responsible for installing all water and sewer infrastructure necessary to serve the property. For electric service, it is City policy that the City of Shelby completes a design and then installs the electric infrastructure necessary to provide service to the property at the City's expense.

After the electrical demands of the project were established, the City of Shelby contracted with Progressive Engineering Consultants, Inc., to design the electric system for Pinnacle Estates. With development projects, the City purchases all materials and then advertises for the installation of the materials by a licensed electrical contractor.

Review

Staff advertised the Pinnacle Estates Subdivision Underground Electric project on the City webpage and bid packages were provided to ten prospective bidders on October 12, 2022. At the bid opening on October 31, 2022, five completed bids and were received. The bid tabulation for these bids is attached to this memorandum and depicts the bids and the unit prices that were received. Progressive Engineering Consultants, Inc. has reviewed the bids received and provided the City with a recommendation of award to the lowest responsive bidder, Utility Partners of America. The low bid submitted by Utility Partners of America was in the amount of \$105,880.73 for the scope of work specified in the bid package. Progressive Engineer's original cost estimate for this project was \$150,000, so the lowest bid received is 29.4% below the estimated cost.

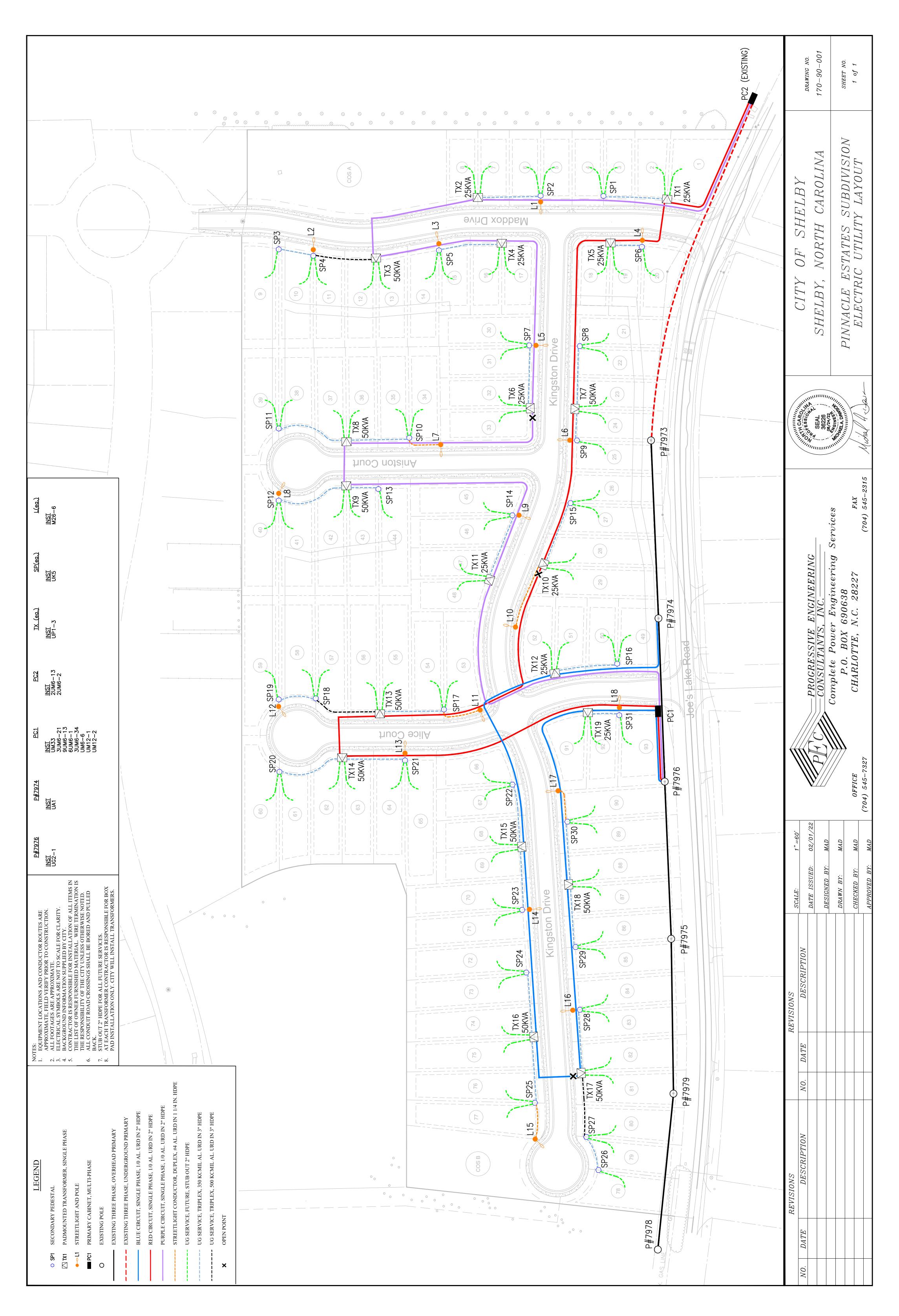
Recommendation
