#### A. Approval of agenda:

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion by Mr. White, City Council voted unanimously to approve the agenda as proposed.

#### B. Public Hearing:

1) Consideration of an ordinance to extend the corporate limits of the City of Shelby, North Carolina: Ordinance No. 1-2023

Mr. Scharer introduced the property located on Hubbard Terrace just off of Wesson Road as two lots totaling approximately one acre and is contiguous to existing city limits. The two lots are currently zoned R-20 and Mr. Scharer clarified that this hearing is not a rezoning hearing only a contiguous voluntary annexation hearing.

Mayor Anthony opened the public hearing at 6:03 p.m. and invited comments from the public.

Noel MacArthur who resides at 1414 Hubbard Terrace, Shelby, North Carolina acknowledged he is the property owner of the lot adjacent to this site. Mr. MacArthur stated he and his wife are in favor of this annexation. Mr. MacArthur further stated he hopes City Council will allow the annexation of the entire road (Hubbard Terrace) in the future.

Mayor Anthony closed the public hearing at 6:05 p.m.

Mayor Anthony disclosed that Mr. Causby once owned the two lots on Hubbard Terrace but is no longer the property owner. Attorney Hooten advised Mr. Causby does not need to recuse himself from the vote.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. White, City Council voted unanimously to approve Ordinance No. 1-2023 entitled, "AN ORDINANCE TO EXTEND THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA."

2) Consideration of an ordinance to extend the corporate limits of the City of Shelby, North Carolina: Ordinance No. 2-2023

Mr. Scharer introduced the property located on Hubbard Terrace just off of Wesson Road as one lot totaling approximately .66 acre. This lot is non-contiguous to the city limits; therefore, this is considered a satellite voluntary annexation. The lot is currently zoned R-20 and Mr. Scharer clarified that this hearing is not a rezoning hearing only a voluntary satellite annexation hearing.

Mayor Anthony opened the public hearing at 6:06 p.m. and invited comments from the public.

#### G. New Business

1) A resolution awarding the contract for the City of Shelby Stormwater Infrastructure Assistance Program project at 715 S. Dekalb St. in Shelby, North Carolina: Resolution No. 1-2023

Mr. Howell presented this resolution and reminded Council that after the Stormwater Program was adopted, staff recommended a certain amount of money to be used for an "off right of way" stormwater assistance program. Mr. Howell further explained that this allotted money helps residential and commercial property owners with drainage work that improves the flow of rain and floodwaters. Mr. Howell acknowledged if this resolution is approved then Two Brothers Utilities, LLC would be awarded the contract for this project in the amount of \$39,721.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. Causby, City Council voted unanimously to approve Resolution No. 1-2023 entitled, "A RESOLUTION AWARDING THE CONTRACT FOR THE CITY OF SHELBY STORMWATER INFRASTRUCTURE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM PROJECT AT 715 S. DEKALB ST. IN SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA."

2) Designation of authorized voting delegate for the North Carolina League of Municipalities 2023-2024 Biennium Legislative Goals, required by January 12, 2023

Mr. Howell introduced this item by reminding Council that the North Carolina League of Municipalities develops legislative goals, and a delegate is required from the city to vote on these goals. Mr. Howell stated he has served as the delegate in the past and would be happy to serve in that capacity again if Council agrees.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. Hopper, City Council voted unanimously to designate City Manager Rick Howell as the

authorized voting delegate for the North Carolina League of Municipalities 2023-2024 Biennium Legislative Goals.

#### H. City Manager's Report

Mayor Anthony appreciated the hard work of our Public Works and Water Resources Department for their work repairing the multiple water main breaks during the recent subfreezing weather. Mr. Howell thanked the Mayor for mentioning this and acknowledged all the Utility and Public Work employees work hard in sometimes tough conditions.

Ms. Arth stated it was great to see everyone after the New Year.

Mr. White stated the City of Shelby is like one big family and our departments work well together. Mr. White also asked about the manhole between Warren Street and Graham Street; Mr. Howell stated that is a sewer project for a private development on that property.

Mr. Causby acknowledged the increase in COVID cases in our area and encouraged everyone to get vaccinated.

Mr. Webber commended the Mayor for his update on Monday with the Mayor. Mr. Webber also welcomed the Leadership Cleveland County class members and offered his help in any way.

Mr. Hopper gave an update on the Gaston/Cleveland/Lincoln MPO meeting he attends regularly. The main NCDOT project in our area is the redesign of Hwy. 150 and Marion Street. Mr. Hopper stated that in the past the bids for this project all came in too high; then this summer there were no bids submitted by construction companies. #### City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Resolution No. 2-2023 is presented for City Council consideration at this time via the Consent Agenda. This resolution would modify the previously adopted Resolution No. 68-2022 which allocated the \$10,200,000 in funding appropriated by the NC General Assembly for water and wastewater projects under Session Law 2022-74. The amended resolution moves \$1,000,000 from the Water/Wastewater Improvements for Residential Development to the Water Plant Filtration Rehabilitation Project. It also moves \$200,000 from the Water and Wastewater System Repairs and Maintenance item to the Water Filtration Rehabilitation Project.

Mr. Hux explains the need to moves these funds in his staff memo to me. I have discussed it with him and agree that it is prudent to do so given the conditions discovered in the water filtration system. I would note that none of the unsewered neighborhood funding is affected by this amendment as that money is from another ARP source.

It is my recommendation that Resolution No. 2-2023 be adopted and approved via the Consent Agenda.

Modified Project Allocations – \$10.2 Million Appropriation

#### **BACKGROUND**

Through Session Law 2022-74, the City of Shelby has been appropriated \$10,200,000 for water and wastewater infrastructure projects. Based on the guidance for these funds, City Staff reviewed infrastructure needs and developed a list of justified projects that meet the submittal and project completion deadlines.

Below is a summary of the projects along with the estimated costs that were anticipated for these projects:

#### 24" Waterline to South Tank and Forest Hills Drive - \$2,000,300

- \$7,700,300 (Total Project Cost)
- \$5,700,000 from previous 2021-2022 State Appropriation

Provides the balance of funding necessary to construct approximately 12,000 linear feet of 24" Waterline from the Marion St./Morgan St. intersection to the South Tank and Forest Hill Dr. via Morgan St., Graham St. and Washington St.

#### Hickory Creek Sewer Windsor to Holly Oak - \$2,105,000

- \$3,805,000 (Total Project Cost)
- \$1,700,000 from previous 2021-2022 State Appropriation

Provides the balance of funding necessary for replacement of approximately 4,800 linear feet of 18" - 24" sewer line from Windsor Drive to US74 and a section south of Earl Road around Holly Oak Park.

#### Water Treatment Plant Filter Rehabilitation - \$2,500,000

Filter rehabilitation of eight filters. Project also provides repair/replacement of sedimentation basin valves. This project is currently being designed for bid and should be ready for bid in February 2023.

#### Existing Water and Sewer System Repairs and Maintenance - \$ 1,594,700

- Funding to be used for water treatment plant filtration improvements, sedimentation basin valving improvements, looping of dead-end waterlines, replacement of water distribution lines and replacement of sewer collection system lines.

#### Water/Sewer System Improvements to Promote Residential Development - \$2,000,000

- This funding would be used to for extension of services for residential development on parcels that lie outside the current service area. Developers would still be required to install water and sewer infrastructure within the new development.

The projects listed above and funding allocations were approved by City Council with Resolution 68-2022 that was approved on November 7, 2022.

#### **REVIEW**

The design phase of the project is nearing completion and the bidding documents have been finalized. As part of the design phase services, McGill Associates has updated the opinion of probable construction cost. The estimate reflects the current construction market and is based on manufacturer equipment quotations and contractor estimates. It is now estimated that the total base bid will be \$3,700,000. The estimated budget cost is approximately \$1,200,000 above the original budget. We believe that this increase is due to the following reasons:

- 1. It was originally intended that twenty-four (24) slide gates on the sedimentation basins would be repaired as part of this project. Due to the age of these slide gates and discussions with the valve manufacturer, replacement parts are not available. Therefore, all twenty-four (24) slide gates will now be fully replaced as part of this project, resulting in an increase in project costs.
  - Currently, half of the treatment plant must be shutdown at one time for basin cleaning and maintenance because of faulty valves. Replacing these valves will allow the staff to shutdown smaller basins for maintenance, particularly during higher treatment plant flows.
- Construction costs have increased universally over the past several years due to unprecedented
  rates of inflation. In particular, stainless-steel prices have grown exponentially. This project includes
  many stainless-steel components including: sixty-four (64) stainless steel mud valves and twentyfour (24) stainless steel slide gates.
- 3. The project includes the rehabilitation of all eight (8) filters. It was determined that coating the filter walls should be added to the project scope to ensure viable filtration for long term operation.
- 4. McGill has recommended an above average contingency factor (15%) is also needed for this project due to the variety of unknowns associated with construction on a facility that is nearly over 75 years old. Furthermore, the condition of the concrete in the filters will not be known until all equipment and media is removed during construction.

The largest increase in the estimated construction is the valve replacement portion. As noted above, staff intended to make repairs to the valves; however, during design the supplier indicated that parts are no longer available. These valves are essential in the operation of the sedimentation basin. Currently, an entire side of the plant must be removed from service to perform basin cleaning and maintenance. As water demand increases, this becomes problematic for longer shutdowns. Replacing the valves will enable staff to have smaller shutdowns.

Staff believes that these funding increases are necessary rehabilitation of a water treatment plant and will allow for safe and reliable drinking water treatment that meets EPA and State standards for the next 30 years.

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

Based on the project shortfall, City staff recommends the following modified project allocations as follows:

The North Carolina Department of Transportation recently provided City Staff with a Certification of Municipal Ordinance Declaring Speed Limit Modifications and Request for Concurring Ordinance form for sections of W. Dixon Blvd. and E. Dixon Blvd. The proposed Ordinance from NCDOT results in the following changes:

- W. Dixon Blvd. (From Charles Rd. to Westside Dr.) decreases from 55 mph to 45 mph
- E. Dixon Blvd. (From Sue Lane to Link Rd. near Showsmars) decreases from 55 mph to 45 mph

Pursuant to General Statute 20-141(f), the City of Shelby must adopt an Ordinance and complete the Certification or Municipal Ordinance from NCDOT to enact and repeal speed limits on NCDOT owned roadways located within Shelby's jurisdiction. The City of Shelby Engineering Department coordinated the review of the proposals outlined in the attached memo from Justin Wright, Civil Engineer. Based on this review, City staff recommends approval of the speed limit modifications proposed by NCDOT.

Staff Recommends adoption of the proposed ordinance and execution of the certification of municipal ordinance provided by the North Carolina Department of Transportation.

Dixon Blvd., Warren St., US 74 Business (Marion St.), NC 18 (Lafayette St.), NC 18 (Fallston Rd)., Washburn Switch Rd., and McBrayer Springs Rd.. Pursuant to General Statute 20-141(f), the City of Shelby must adopt an Ordinance and complete the Certification or Municipal Ordinance from NCDOT to enact and repeal speed limits on NCDOT roadways located within Shelby's jurisdiction.

City Council approved Ordinance No. 53-2022 to repeal/enact the proposed changes. NCDOT has approached the City again to repeal two additional ordinances in order to enforce changes on US 74 that were previously approved in Ordinance No. 53-2022.

#### Review

The Police, Department, Fire Department, Public Works, and Engineering Department has reviewed the speed limit modifications request by NCDOT. The proposed speed limit modifications are:

#### West Dixon Blvd (US 74)


• To repeal ordinance number 1058792; a 45 MPH speed limit on W. Dixon Blvd from a point .36 southeast of SR 1253 (Charles Rd.), southeastward to a point .19 mile northwest of SR 1233 (Link Road)

- To repeal ordinance number 1058791; a 55 MPH speed limit on W. Dixon Blvd. from a point .09 mile southeast of SR 1396 (Creek Road), eastward to a point .36 mile southeast of SR 1253 (Charles Rd.)
- This would result in a decrease from 55 mph to 45 mph between Charles Rd to Westside and Sue Ln. to Link Rd.

#### **Background**

Shelby City Council approved resolution 65-2019 authorizing the selection of TGS Engineers to perform the professional services related to the City of Shelby portion of the Rail Trail. Following the approval of City Council, staff began working with TGS engineers to develop a phased plan that will allow sections of the Rail Trail to continuously be constructed. Below are the plans phases of the City's Portion of the Shelby Rail Trail:

- Segment IA (Sunset Cemetery to Marion St.)
- Segment IB (Grover St. to Sunset Cemetery)
- Segment IIA (Marion St. to Depot Park)
- Depot Park (Not Included in this Contract)
- Segment IIB (Depot Park to S. Dekalb St.)

#### Review

#### Traffic Signal Work

City staff worked with TGS Engineers to prepare completed construction documents for City of Shelby Rail Trail Phase IA and continues to progress in the design of Phase IIA. During the design process multiple aesthetics and safety precautions have been expressed from the City of Shelby and by TGS engineers. In order to expand the Uptown Shelby aesthetic and pedestrian crossing safety TGS and their subcontract Impact Engineering has identified the following intersection for traffic signal upgraded designs:

- Morgan Street and West Marion Street
- Morgan Street and West Warren Street
- Morgan Street and West Graham Street
- Morgan Street/Broad Street and Lafayette Street

These intersections would include signal upgrade that would be designed to utilize black powder coated mast arms identical to the mast arms around Uptown Shelby. Pedestrian push buttons and pedestrian signals will be included in the design of each intersection to improve pedestrian safety. Impact Design will be responsible for the design of the intersection and will handle all coordination with North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) along with complying with NCDOT, Americans with Disabilities (ADA), and Public Right-of-Way Accessibility Guideline (PROWAG) standards in their signal upgrade design.

#### Retaining Wall

During the construction of the first segment of the rail trail structural drawing for the retaining wall located between Sumter St. Bridge and Marion St intersection was sent to Gravix to provide detail drawings along with specification for installing the wall. These structural drawing came back to TGS with a larger embedment and requires the wall to have a larger square footage than expected. TGS Engineer's recommend City of Shelby to continue with Retaining wall that has been proposed by Gravix due to this will help stabilize the area and will prevent any future problems along this critical bank. Please see table below for the additional tasks or requirements in the table below.

Impact Designs, Inc. is pleased to provide you with this Transportation Engineering Services Agreement for the above referenced project. We understand that the City of Shelby is pursuing a rail trail along Morgan Street. It is our understanding the 4 signal upgrades would like to be pursued by the City as a part of this project. The following is our proposed scope of services for the Project ("Services"). The parties acknowledge that the scope of services may change following consultation or coordination with the local governmental agencies and/or North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT). The parties agree that should the scope of services change following any such consultation or coordination, Impact Designs will provide the Client with a revised proposal or an addendum to this agreement setting forth any such changes and associated costs to be paid by Client.

#### I.) SCOPE OF SERVICES:

#### A.) Signal Design(s):

1. Prepare a letter to the NCDOT requesting a traffic signal agreement between the City and NCDOT (if an existing agreement doesn't already exist) for the 4 traffic signal upgrades. The letter will describe in general terms the scope of the traffic signal improvements and party responsibilities that are anticipated at the intersection.

#### Traffic Signal Upgrade Designs

- 1) Morgan Street and West Marion Street
- 2) Morgan Street and West Warren Street
- 3) Morgan Street and West Graham Street
- 4) Morgan Street and Lafayette Street
- 2. We will utilize CADD files provided by others for the base plan. Surveys are not included in this scope of work.
- 3. An on-site field review of the intersection with the base plan in hand will be made to locate possible conflicts and obtain notes of existing field conditions.
- 4. Traffic signal design plans will be prepared in accordance with the latest NCDOT standards and specifications.
- We will coordinate with the NCDOT to determine special requirements of the traffic signal, if necessary.

- 6. Drawings will include intersection layout, loop detector chart and layout, signal head identification and location, phasing diagram, signal head sequence chart, timing information, electrical details and stop bar location detail.
- 7. We will submit copies of the plans to the NCDOT for review and comment.
- 8. Based on review comments, we will make the necessary corrections to the plans and prepare final plans for distribution.
- 9. Neither construction inspection nor administration is included in the base fee of this proposal. In the event of field conflicts due to the plan prepared by us, we will coordinate with the contractor on-site to work out the details.
- 10. This fee proposal does not include the preparation of "as-built" drawings of the intersection after completion of the project. It is normal practice for the selected signal contractor to 'red-line' any minor changes to the signal plans and forward to NCDOT as a Plan of Record. We will gladly provide these services, if requested, to be invoiced on an hourly fee basis.

#### **B.)** Mast Arm Designs

- 1. Impact will develop mast arm loading diagrams to indicate where signal head and sign loads will need to be placed on the mast arms.

#### 1.01 Payment Procedures

- A. *Invoices*: Invoices are due and payable upon receipt. If Client fails to make any payment due Engineer for Services, extra work, or expenses within 30 days after receipt of Engineer's invoice, then (1) the amounts due Engineer will be increased at the rate of 1.5% per month (or the maximum rate of interest permitted by law, if less) from said thirtieth day, and (2) in addition Engineer may, after giving three days written notice to Client, suspend Services under this Agreement until Engineer has been paid in full all amounts due for Services, extra work, expenses, and other related charges. Client waives any and all claims against Engineer for any such suspension.
- B. *Payment:* As compensation for Engineer providing or furnishing Services and extra work, Client shall pay Engineer as set forth herein. If Client disputes an invoice, either as to amount or entitlement, then Client shall promptly advise Engineer in writing of the specific basis for doing so, may withhold only that portion so disputed, and must pay the undisputed portion.

#### 2.01 Termination

- A. The obligation to continue performance under this Agreement may be terminated for cause:
  - 1. By either party upon 14 days written notice in the event of substantial failure by the other party to perform in accordance with the Agreement's terms through no fault of the terminating party. Failure to pay Engineer for its Services shall constitute a substantial failure to perform and a basis for termination.
  - 2. By Engineer:
    - a. upon seven days written notice if Client demands that Engineer furnish or perform services contrary to Engineer's responsibilities as a licensed professional; or
    - b. upon seven days written notice if the Engineer's Services are delayed for more than 30 days for reasons beyond Engineer's control.

- D. The Agreement may be terminated for convenience by Client effective upon Engineer's receipt of written notice from Client.
- E. In the event of any termination under Paragraph 2.01.D, Engineer will be entitled to invoice Client and to receive full payment for all Services and extra work performed or furnished in accordance with this Agreement, plus reimbursement of expenses incurred through the effective date of termination in connection with providing the Services and extra work, Engineer's consultants' charges, if any, and any other reasonable costs incurred by Engineer as a result of such termination.

#### 3.01 General Considerations

## BUDGET ORDINANCE AMENDMENT FOR THE CITY OF SHELBY'S RAIL TRAIL CORRIDOR PROJECT

WHEREAS, in accordance with applicable provisions of the North Carolina Budget and Fiscal Control Act, the City of Shelby finds it advisable and necessary to revise and amend its capital project ordinance and budgets for the City of Shelby's Rail Trail Corridor Project; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager (Budget Officer) has recommended certain amendments to the budget which the governing body finds acceptable; and,

WHEREAS, City Council now desires to act on the recommended budget amendments and approve the same for implementation and compliance with the North Carolina Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA:

<u>Section 1</u>. Ordinance No. 34-2017, the City's Rail Trail Corridor Project, is hereby amended as follows to provide for Budget Amendment No. 5 for said project:

#### City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

This item is presented for City Council consideration under unfinished business. Approval would simply acknowledge the finding of the auditor that the City of Shelby had one Financial Performance Indicator of Concern. As presented previously by Ms. Thompson of Martin Starnes and Associates, CPA's, P.A. at your December 5, 2022 meeting the City was late in meeting the submittal deadline of December 1, 2022 established by the Local Government Commission. The City submitted on December 15, 2022.

It was explained to Council at that time that during the audit season the City accounting office experienced retirements of 2 seasoned employees and the relocation of another employee out of state. These vacancies left the accounting division critically short of people resources to complete much of the audit preparation work.

It is my recommendation that City Council adopt a simple motion authorizing the response to the independent auditors findings, recommendations and fiscal matters and that this be transmitted to the LGC as required.

#### Background:

State law requires that all municipal governments publish a complete set of financial statements presented in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles and those statements must be audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. The completed audit report is expected to be submitted to the Local Government Commission of NC within five months plus one day from the fiscal year end – December 1<sup>st</sup>.

#### **Review and Comments:**

Martin Starnes and Associates, CPA's, P.A. has audited the City of Shelby's financial statements for the year ending June 30, 2022. The audit firm is required to inform the Governing Body of any financial indicators of concern noted from the data input sheet submitted to the Local Government Commission along with the filing of the audit report. Ms. Thompson did inform Shelby's Governing Board of the one indicator identified in her presentation on December 5<sup>th</sup>, 2022 – a late submission of the audit. The City of Shelby must submit a "Response to the Auditor's Findings, Recommendations and Fiscal Matters" to the LGC within 60 days of the audit presentation.

#### Recommendation:

The recommendation from staff is for the Governing Body to acknowledge and sign the required response for fiscal year ending June 30, 2022 in the January 23, 2023 agenda and direct staff to submit the response to the Local Government Commission.



## RESPONSE TO THE INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S FINDINGS, RECOMMENDATIONS, AND FISCAL MATTERS

For Fiscal Year Ending 6/30/2022, the City of Shelby had one (1) Financial Performance Indicator of Concern.

#### Financial Performance Indicators of Concern:

Indicator: The 2022 Audit Report is expected to be submitted within five months plus one day from the year end per the auditor. (December 1<sup>st</sup> for most units.)

Condition: The City of Shelby's audit was submitted on December 15<sup>th</sup>, 2022.

The City of Shelby's accounting division experienced the retirement of two employees and the relocation to another state of a third employee during the fiscal year and audit season. Due to these vacancies, additional time was need this fiscal year to complete the information and the preparation of related journal entries for the year-end closing. During the audit process, an error was detected in the capital asset reporting module of our ERP system after all schedules were completed causing the capital asset work to have to be recalculated once the error was detected and corrected. The implementation of GASB 87 for the recording of leases also required additional attention. Both the capital asset and lease issues are one-time delays that will not be repeated in future years. We have added 3 new staff members who are assets to the accounting division. We will apply additional year-end close and audit preparation procedures to ensure all necessary audit documentation is made available to the auditors during the agreed upon time.

#### Summary

As detailed in the attached memo by Justin Wright, Civil Engineer, City staff desires to evaluate the potential for a lane reconfiguration on Graham St. from Dekalb St. to Morgan St. The potential reconfiguration would create a one through lane in each direction with a center turn lane and on street parking as width and driveway access allows. This is a similar layout to the streets that were modified as part of the recent Uptown Streetscape Project and is intended to promote pedestrian, cyclist and vehicular safety.

In compliance with NC General Statutes and the Mini Brooks Actf, City staff advertised a Request of Qualifications and received four responses from professional engineering firms. After evaluations of the proposals were conducted independently by four City staff, this committee made a recommendation to select TGS Engineers to complete this Traffic Impact Analysis.

This professional services contract will evaluate various factors such as the street widths, driveway locations, traffic volumes and turning traffic volumes, and then make a recommendation on the proposed street configuration. This recommendation will be based on a quantitative comparison of the "Levels of Service" of the existing layout versus the proposed layout.

It is important to note that this contract will provide City staff with the information necessary to determine the best long-term street layout for Graham St. that could be implemented in the future if desired by Council. As you may recall, the City of Shelby Water Resources Department has plans to construct a 24" water transmission line along this street. This water line project is anticipated to be completed in the next 18-24 months (dependent on material lead times) and any street reconfiguration will occur after the water line project has been completed.

Based on the recommendation by the City staff RFQ review committee, I recommend that City Council approve the attached Resolution authorizing the selection of TGS Engineers for the Traffic Impact Analysis of a potential lane reconfiguration on Graham St. from Dekalb St. to Morgan St.





#### City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Resolution No. 4-2023 is presented for City Council consideration at this time as a new business item. If approved this resolution simply states the City's intent to close the noted streets and provides notice to the public of this intent. A public hearing is also set for Monday, February 20, 2023 to hear public comment. All affected property owners will receive notice either by newspaper publication, certified mail and posted public notice. This action is initiated at the request of the adjoining property owners.

A brief explanation. The petitioner for closure in this instance owns 100% of the frontage along Ella Street and the short segment of S. Washington Street between Textile Street and E Shannonhouse Street. It is the petitioners intent, if approved, to utilize the property as part of the multi family residential development proposed for the area.

I have asked City staff to work toward addressing some issues of concern. This would include whether the City can put conditions on the closure that would allow the street right of way to revert back to the City if the development is not built. The City would likely retain utility easements for water, sewer, electric and natural gas lines unless staff deems it unnecessary. A more detailed recommendation would be brough forth at the time of the public hearing. Action tonight merely adopts a resolution making the public aware that the City has been petitioned and that the City intends to consider the petition following a public hearing.

It is my recommendation that Resolution No. 4-2023 be adopted and approved by City Council at this time.





Section 4. This Resolution of Intent shall become effective upon its adoption and approval.

# City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Ordinance No. 6-2023 is presented for City Council consideration as a new business item. If approved this ordinance would place restrictions on the location and time allowed for on street parking on Edgemont Street. I would refer you to the map contained in the agenda packet prepared by staff.

A number of citizens living on and adjacent to Edgemont Street have submitted a petition requesting consideration of the changes recommended by City staff. The recommendations address concerns noted by residents and various staff members. These include proximity of parking near the Edgemont Street intersections with E Marion Street to reduce site visibility issues and the possible blocking of a fire hydrant. It limits the length of time parking is allowed on Edgemont Street as well to 2 hours to prevent overnight parking and to allow residents on the street to benefit from the parking designation.

The following signatures below are in support of limited parking on the street sides of Edgemont Avenue between the intersections of East Marion Street and Hawthorn Ave. We feel it is in the best interest of safety for traffic exiting East Marion Street onto Edgemont Avenue as well as traffic flowing towards Marion Street. The short span between these intersections consist of a multifamily housing complex entrance and three residential driveways. For the past 12 month period the street has been used for commercial and personal vehicle parking by residents of the multifamily complex. This parking is continuously denying street-side pickup of yard waste and rollout containers. On a recent traffic fatality on Marion Street, this portion of Edgemont was used to detour traffic. This heavy flow of two way traffic from the detour along with the street-side parking complicated the safe flow of traffic. Detours are very common through our neighborhood.

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

# A PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 42-172(b) TWO-HOUR PARKING AND 42-173 PARKING PROHIBITED ON CERTAIN STREETS

**WHEREAS**, the City of Shelby has received a petition requesting two-hour parking on a portion of Edgemont Avenue located within the City; and,

WHEREAS, the City staff have reviewed said petition and has made their findings and recommendations to City Council; and,

WHEREAS, time-limited on-street parking contributes to traffic calming and improves traffic safety; and,

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA:

**Section 1.** The Code of Ordinances, Section 42-172(b) and Section 42-173, is hereby amended to read as follows:

# Sec. 42-172. Two-hour parking.

(b) On designated streets Mills Street. It shall be unlawful for any person to park a motor vehicle for more than two consecutive hours, on the streets and portions of streets within the city as indicated below:

Parking of motor vehicles shall be prohibited on both sides of Dover Drive for a distance of 50 feet west from its intersection with Dover Street.

Parking of motor vehicles shall be prohibited on both sides of Edgemont Avenue for a distance of 135 feet south from its intersection with East Marion Street.

**Section 2.** The City Clerk of the City of Shelby is hereby authorized and directed to cause the provisions of Section 2 of this ordinance to be properly codified.

**Section 3.** This ordinance shall become effective upon its adoption and approval.
