Background

Officer David Karl Gemes was hired by the City of Shelby as a law enforcement officer on May 2, 1996. On October 1, 2024, Officer Gemes retired after twenty-eight years of honorable service to the Shelby Police Department and our community. During his tenure with the Shelby Police Department, Officer Gemes served in many roles, including Patrol Officer, Criminal Investigations Division Detective, CALEA (Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc.) Accreditation Manager, G.R.E.A.T. (Gang Resistance Education and Training) Program Officer, and most recently served as a School Resource Officer. Officer Gemes was well known and respected both within the department and in our community. During his tenure, Officer Gemes completed over 2,900 hours of law enforcement training and has received his Law Enforcement Advanced Certificate from the North Carolina Criminal Justice Education and Training Standards Commission.

Review

When Officer Gemes retired on October 1, 2024, he had twenty-eight years of credible service in the NC Local Government Retirement System. Prior to his retirement, a reception was held in honor of his service to our community. During this time, he was honored for his leadership and commitment to protect and serve our community.

City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

This time is scheduled a City Council's agenda to allow for the presentation of the award from the Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI) to the City of Shelby recognizing the Fire and Rescue Department for maintaining accreditation status. A tremendous amount of work has gone in to the reaccreditation process and it is certainly appropriate for these efforts to be recognized publicly. Division Chief David Farnam (City of Charlotte Fire and Rescue) will present the plaque on behalf of CFAI. Chief Hunt has also requested a few minutes at this time on the agenda to make a presentation required by the terms of international accreditation received by the City of Shelby Fire and Rescue Department through the Commission on Fire Accreditation International. This reaccreditation is valid for a five year period. An important component is for the department to demonstrate to the accrediting agency that it has worked toward "continuous improvement" and demonstrated accountability to the governing board, city management and the community at large. Chief Hunt will provide relevant information pertaining to the recommendations for improvement identified by the peer assessment team.

Subject: Recognition of the Fire & Rescue Department on its award of accredited agency status by

the Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI) through the Center for Public

Safety Excellence (CPSE).

Background

The Center for Public Safety Excellence (CPSE) is the accrediting body for the fire service profession. The CPSE's Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI) oversees the agency accreditation process through a twelve-member commission of professionals representing the fire service, city-county management, standards-making bodies, organized labor, the insurance industry, and the Department of Defense. There are over 300 accredited agencies in the United States, Canada, and US military installations. Approximately 13 percent of the US population is protected by an accredited fire department. Accredited agency status is awarded for a five-year period; the City of Shelby Fire & Rescue has been accredited by CPSE since 2014.

Review

The Fire & Rescue Department filed its final accredited agency annual compliance report for the period on July 15, 2023, and subsequently submitted its application for a third term as an accredited agency. After submitting the required agency self-assessment documents, the department was designated candidate status on February 6, 2024. The CFAI formed a peer team consisting of four fire service professionals under the leadership of Deputy Chief Sean Daniels (Mt. Lebanon, PA) to assess the Fire & Rescue Department to determine eligibility. After a preliminary evaluation, a site visit was scheduled for April 28-May 2, 2024, to allow the peer team to verify and validate the findings in the department's self-assessment documents. During the site visit, peer team members reviewed documents and exhibits, toured critical public safety infrastructure, and conducted interviews with fire department staff, city officials, and representatives from partnering agencies.

At the conclusion of the site visit, the peer team found the Fire & Rescue Department credible in all areas and recommended accreditation. On August 7, 2019, representatives from the department attended the CFAI commission hearings in Atlanta, GA. Based on the findings of the peer assessment team's accreditation report and testimony from those in attendance, the commission unanimously approved the City of Shelby Fire & Rescue for accredited agency status for a five-year term ending in 2029.

Action

Please place on the Shelby City Council's agenda for November 4, 2024, for the formal presentation of accredited agency status by the Commission on Fire Accreditation International to the City of Shelby Fire & Rescue. Division Chief David Farnum (Charlotte, NC), coordinator of the North Carolina Accreditation Consortium (NCAC), will present the award of accreditation to the city on behalf of CFAI. Following the presentation, I will be available to answer council member questions related to the peer assessment team's report.

Mayor Anthony called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and delivered the invocation.

Ms. Arth led the Pledge of Allegiance.

A. Approval of Agenda:

1) Motion to adopt the agenda as presented.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion by Mr. Hopper, City Council voted unanimously to approve the agenda with Additions.

B. Special Presentation

1) City of Shelby's Comprehensive Plan Update

Presenter: Carroll Williamson, representative from Stewart:

- In the process of initiation and assessment (i.e. community tour, steering committee meetings, stakeholder interviews, and community surveys).
- As the data is gathered, plans and goals that reflect the community will begin.
- Implementation and adoption are projected for June of 2025.
- Steering Committee responsibilities include regular meetings (4-5 throughout project), participation in discussions and contribute ideas and opinions, getting others involved, being an ambassador for this Plan to the

community and being an advocate for the community to the development of this Plan.

- A Comprehensive Plan makes forecasts based on past trends and data and looks forward to a 10-20-year timeframe.
- Future Land Use establishes a vision for the community while zoning establishes the rules for achieving that vision.
- Previous planning efforts include City of Shelby Comprehensive Land Use Plan in 2009, Shelby Center City Master Plan in 2017, Shelby Rail Trail Master Plan in 2018, Shelby Depot Park Master Plan in 2020, Shelby Bike Ped Plan in 2020, Cleveland County Comprehensive Land Use Plan in 2021, and Shelby Parks and Recreation Comprehensive Master Plan in 2021.
- City of Shelby Population has grown by 13% from 2000 to 2020 and the median household income has increased 34% since 2000.
- Visioning Workshops for the Comprehensive Plan will be Monday, September 16th from 5:00pm-7:00pm at the City Park and Tuesday, September 17th from 4:00pm-6:00pm at Holly Oak Park.
- Stakeholder interviews will be late September-early October.

C. Public Comment:

Phyllis Williams, who resides at 1030 Sue Lane, Shelby, North Carolina spoke on behalf of the homelessness and poverty issues we have in Shelby. Ms. Williams stated she is a Community Chaplin and Cleveland County DSS worker. She shared that the poverty level in Shelby is 18.4%, which she claimed is higher than the national level at 12%. Ms. Williams publicly asked the community to come up with ways to assist the homeless and those living in poverty.

Gary Leigh, who resides at 922 Surry Drive, Shelby, North Carolina spoke towards the issue of homelessness. He stated that he is working to eliminate homelessness in this county and asked that the community join him and put together resources.

Michael McGuirt, who resides at 2313 North Lafayette Street, Shelby, North Carolina spoke on behalf of homelessness and addicts in the area. Mr. McGuirt stated that he is a Re-entry Coordinator and Outreach Worker for Oxford House. He shared that a 2021 report showed that 30% of homeless in the area suffer from mental health issues. Mr. McGuirt shared a concern that the hospital here does not have an opioid testing system for Fentanyl nor an opioid reversal program. He states that there is plenty of infrastructure in the area for programs and it is up to the community to help those that are struggling.

Tracey Norris, who resides at 634 South Lafayette Street, Shelby, North Carolina also shared concerns about the growing homelessness in the area. She stated that her organization, House of Hope Outreach, Inc. assists the homeless

and displaced at their church every Monday from 11:00am-1:00pm. Ms. Norris asked the Council how many empty buildings and boarded up houses they see when riding around Shelby. She states that those could be used to assist homeless in the community.

Brooke Nicholson, who resides at 228 South Lafayette Street, Shelby, North Carolina, from Angie Brooke Boutique, spoke on behalf of a Special Event application that was submitted for council approval. Ms. Nicholson came to answer any questions about the event.

Allyssa Givens, passed

Deborah Blackwell, who resides at 1627 Woodland Avenue, Shelby, North Carolina, spoke in opposition of a Dollar General store being built near her neighborhood. Ms. Blackwell shared her concerns with the store being built right behind her house.

D. Public Hearings:

1) Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina for parcel 24083 (N Post Road): Ordinance No. 54-2024

Council Member White requested to be recused from the vote as it would be a conflict of interest. Council voted and unanimously approved the recusal.

Presenter: Brian Burgess, Planning Director:

- Applicant wishes to amend the zoning district from R10 to Corridor Protection District (CPD) at 215 North Post Road, Shelby, North Carolina.
- The property is approximately 2.3-acres and is located on the eastern side of the city north of the intersection of Marion Street and Post Road
- The surrounding area has GB, GB2, and R10 zoning districts.
- Corridor Protection District zoning district is consistent with the current development patterns, and inconsistent with the Future Land Use Map.
- Staff recommends the approval of the rezoning.
- Planning and Zoning Board have recommended approval of this zoning request.

Mayor Anthony opened the public hearing at 6:43 p.m.

Marna McMurry, who resides at 317 Tremont Place, Shelby, North Carolina spoke in opposition of the proposed rezoning. Ms. McMurry stated she is against the rezoning request for the following reasons:

- It would not be an appropriate fit for her community as it is a family community.
- The neighborhood will experience a negative traffic impact.
- Being that the proposed rezoning is potentially for a discount food store, it could harm local grocery stores.

Taryn Stetson, who resides at 4500 Cameron Valley Parkway, Charlotte, North Carolina, spoke on behalf of the applicant to answer any questions from Council.

Mayor Anthony closed the public hearing at 6:48 p.m.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Ms. Arth, City Council voted 2 - 3 (Arth, Bullock in favor - Webber, Hopper and Causby against) to DENY Ordinance No. 54-2024 entitled, "Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina for parcel 24083 (N Post Road)", so the motion to deny failed.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. Causby, City Council voted 3 - 2 (Webber, Hopper and Causby in favor – Bullock and Arth against) to APPROVE and adopt Ordinance No. 54-2024 entitled, "Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina for parcel 24083 (N Post Road)."

2) Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina for parcels 66586, 28375, and 58270 (Randolph Road): Ordinance No. 55-2024

Presenter: Brian Burgess, Planning Director:

- This is a City initiated rezoning request to amend the zoning district located at 2215 Randolph Road, Shelby, NC. It is the site of the most recent Shell Building, and it is approximately 60 acres.
- The City is requesting it be rezoned from LI (Light Industrial) and R20 (Residential) to GI (General Industrial).
- Staff and Planning & Zoning Board recommended approval.

Mayor Anthony opened the public hearing at 6:54 p.m. The public offered no comments.

Mayor Anthony closed the public hearing at 6:55 p.m.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Mr. White, with a statement that the rezoning is consistent with the surrounding zonings, City Council voted unanimously to APPROVE and adopt Ordinance No. 55-2024 entitled, "Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina for parcels 66586, 28375, and 58270 (Randolph Road)."

3) Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina for parcels 30166, 30167, and 30168 (S Lafayette Street): Ordinance No. 56-2024

Presenter: Brian Burgess, Planning Director:

- Applicant wishes to amend the zoning district from R10 (Residential) to CPD (Corridor Protection District) at 1769 S Lafayette Street, Shelby, NC.
- The property is approximately 1.92 acres and is located on S Lafayette Street north of the Dekalb Street/College Avenue Intersection.
- The surrounding zoning has R10 and CPD zoning districts.
- The Future Land Use Map calls for this area to be a commercial zoning district.
- The Corridor Protection District zoning district is consistent with the surrounding area and the Future Land Use map.
- Staff and the Planning & Development Board recommended approval of this zoning request.

Mayor Anthony opened the public hearing at 6:57 p.m. The public offered no comments.

Mayor Anthony closed the public hearing at 6:58 p.m.

ACTION TAKEN: Upon a motion made by Ms. Arth, with a statement that the rezoning is consistent with the surrounding zoning district and consistent with the Future Land Use Map, City Council voted unanimously to APPROVE and adopt Ordinance No. 56-2024 entitled, "Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina for parcels 30166, 30167, and 30168 (S Lafayette Street)."

4) Consideration of a proposed ordinance amending the zoning map of the City of Shelby, North Carolina for parcels 22186, 22301, and 22284 (E Marion Street, Borders Road): Ordinance No. 57-2024

Presenter: Brian Burgess, Planning Director:

- Brian explained to Council that the rezoning was a conditional rezoning, which would allow Council to negotiate conditions with the applicant.
- The property is approximately 46.14 acres and is located south of the Cleveland County Fairgrounds and east of Marion Ridge Apartments, with access to E Marion Street and Borders Road.
- The applicant wishes to amend the zoning district from R20 (Residential) to R6-CZ for a single-family subdivision.
- The Planning & Zoning Board voted to table the zoning request and asked the applicant to revise the proposed plan to show additional proposed features.

Mayor Anthony opened the public hearing at 7:03 p.m.

Todd Doupona, who resides at 8307 Hampton Fare Lane, Waxhaw, NC, spoke on behalf of the Applicant and informed Council that the landscape detail that was requested has been added to the front page of the submittal.

H. City Manager's Report:

Justin Longino, Assistant City Manager, utilized this time to go over Webbley and Council Chamber Renovation Project updates.

Mr. Howell explained a current matter regarding an approximate 30-acre tract that Robert Johnson, a local developer, owns and wants to develop. Mr. Johnson would like to have water and sewer available in this new development.

Mr. Howell stated that Mr. Johnson initially requested a voluntary annexation into the City of Shelby, but Patterson Springs is the closest municipality to this parcel, so they would have to agree to annexing this property into the City of Shelby. Mr. Johnson communicated to Mr. Howell that Patterson Springs was not in favor of allowing the annexation, so he has withdrawn his voluntary annexation.

Mr. Howell stated that extending the ETJ would accomplish Mr. Johnson's desire to have water and sewer available at this development. The 30-acre tract is located outside of the current ETJ but adjacent to other city served subdivisions. Mr. Howell stated that if the City proceeds with this request, then the City has to notify the Cleveland County Commissioners for consideration, and then conduct a Public Hearing on the matter.

Mr. Howell also stated that City departments have the ability to supply City services to this 30-acre tract.

By consensus, City Council directed Mr. Howell to proceed with the request to the County Commissioners to extend the current ETJ to include this 30-acre property.

F. City Manager's Report:

Regarding County Home Road project: The removal of the Duke Energy pole is currently delayed due to Hurricane Helene and the recovery efforts being put in by Duke employees. No timeframe given at this time.

Regarding Webbley: DFI plans on conducting small group meetings with Council members the first part of November. Bre will schedule those appointments.

ARP project updates: Mr. Howell will send out these updates to Council next week.

Regarding Depot Park: Plans have been received and a recommendation to Council is upcoming.

Regarding City Hall Annex: Mr. Longino will update Council on this project, there have been some structural issues that need to be addressed.

Regarding Hurricane Helene debris removal: The volume of debris is significant, and people are going to need to be patient. The City has entered into an agreement with the County and third-party contractor to clean up the debris.

There will be no financial obligation from the City; the County will be reimbursed by FEMA funds. With leaf season approaching, it complicates the street clean up. Mr. Howell reiterated to please be patient.

Mr. Howell informed Council that former City Manager Dee Freeman underwent surgery today; our thoughts and prayers are extended to him and his family.

Also, sadly, Mr. Howell mentioned that former Planning and Development Director Walter Scharer passed away earlier today. Walt was a wonderful man, and we want to extend our thoughts and prayers to his family and friends.

City Manager's Recommendation / Comments

Resolution No. 65-2024 is presented to City Council via the Consent Agenda as a routine and administrative matter. If approved this resolution simply authorizes the donation of easements for the Carolina Harmony Trail Phase II. Because the City has received federal funds via the NCDOT there are rules governing how any permanent or temporary construction easements are acquired. Two of these easements are construction easements and the remaining two are permanent. Mr. Yarboro has outlined the specifics of this matter in his memorandum dated October 28, 2024.

Background

As detailed in the attached memorandum from Justin Wright, Engineering Manager, the City of Shelby contracted with TGS Engineers to perform the professional engineering services related to the design of the City of Shelby portion of the Carolina Harmony Trail multi-use path project. We are currently in the final stages of completing the design of Phase II of this project which extends from Marion St. to Depot Park & from Depot Park to Dekalb St. A portion of the funding for this project is from NCDOT and therefore must comply with the requirements of the NCDOT's Local Programs Management Office (LPMO). One of the specific requirements of the NCDOT is that a detailed process for the easements that are necessary for construction must be followed. The plans prepared by TGS Engineers identified 13 properties where temporary and/or permanent easements were required. As noted by Mr. Wright, the City of Shelby owns three (3) properties that must have legal easements established. The total acreage of the easements needed from the properties owned by the City are as follows:

Temporary easements: 0.618 acresPermanent easements: 0.261 acres

The total claim value of all the necessary easements from the City of Shelby properties is \$19,500. As with all of the owners' of property requiring easements for the project, the City of Shelby has the right to donate the easements. With this as an option, City staff recommends the City of Shelby donate the easements detailed by Mr. Wright to the City of Shelby.

Following the completion of the right of way acquisitions in a manner that complies with NCDOT requirements, the City will receive the necessary NCDOT Right of Way certification that is required for the project to be advertised and bid. City staff

anticipates this project being approved by NCDOT for advertising around Dec. 1, 2024 which would result in a bid opening in January 2025.

Recommendation

City staff recommends approval of the Resolution that has been prepared for the City of Shelby to donate the temporary and/or permanent easements on the three (3) properties owned by the City of Shelby for construction of the Carolina Harmony Trail Project.

Background

On October 7, 2019, the Shelby City Council approved Resolution 65-2019, authorizing the selection of TGS Engineers to perform professional services related to the City of Shelby portion of the Carolina Harmony Trail. Following this approval by City Council, staff worked with TGS Engineers to develop a phased plan that will allow sections of the Rail Trail to be constructed. Below are the planned phases of the City's portion of the Carolina Harmony Trail:

- Phase IA (Sunset Cemetery to Marion St.)
- Phase IB (Grover to Sunset Cemetery)
- Phase II (Marion St. to Depot Park & Depot Park to Dekalb St.)

Phase IA of the Carolina Harmony Trail was completed in November of 2023. Phase IA consisted of 0.65 miles of greenway trail that was constructed by Piedmont Utility Group, LLC.

Review

Currently, staff is working with TGS Engineers on the design of Phase II of the Carolina Harmony Trail that goes from Marion Street to Depot Park and Depot Park Dekalb Street. With this being a Locally Administered Project that receives federal funds it has to follow NCDOT guidelines and review process. In the process, NCDOT requires right-of-way plans to be submitted along with the number of properties that require either a permanent or temporary easement. During the design of the right-of-way plans, it was determined that thirteen (13) properties were identified where a right-of-way easement was needed in order to construct Phase II of the Carolina Harmony Trail. Out of these thirteen (13) properties, the City of Shelby owns three (3) of the properties.

The three (3) properties the City owns are listed below, along with the easement areas and Right-of-Way Claim Report Total:

Parcel 17126

This parcel is known as the Morgan Street Parking Lot, located behind United Way and Shelby Café. The Permeant Easement is needed for stormwater, curb and gutter, and sidewalk to be installed as a part of the Carolina Harmony Trail Project. A Temporary Construction Easement is needed to allow room for the contractor to work in this area.

- 0.412 Acres for Temporary Construction Easement
- 0.030 Acres for Permeant Easement
- Claim value of \$6,850.00

Parcel 28706

This parcel will house Depot Park. Easements are needed for the Carolina Harmony Trail project to install stormwater, curb and gutter, and pavers, along with roadway improvements. The areas identified in the easements are areas where the Carolina Harmony Trail will tie into the Depot Park Project.

- 0.180 Acres for permeant Easement
- Claim value of \$7,375.00

Parcel 19627

This parcel is located across from Wendy's on South Lafayette Street. Easements are needed for the Carolina Harmony Trail Project to install stormwater infrastructure.

- 0.206 acres for temporary construction easement
- 0.051 acres for permanent easement
- Claim value of \$5,275.00


The City of Shelby has the opportunity to donate the property or seek compensation from itself for the easements.

All rights, title, and privileges herein granted and all benefits and burdens made part of this Agreement shall run with the land and shall be binding upon and inure to the heirs, successors, and assigns of each record owner of a tract.

A Permanent and Temporary Construction Easement

The Grantor acknowledges that the Grantee (the City of Shelby) is obtaining this easement(s) for the purpose of improving a public street and future rail trail located within the City of Shelby and specifically grants unto the Grantee or its agents the right to enter onto and make improvements on the aforesaid property according to such plans and specifications, as will, the Grantee's opinion, best serve the public purpose, including, but not limited to, the right of removing any obstruction interfering with the construction, maintenance, installation, repair, or enlarging of a public street, including the installation of drainage, and erosion control structures on the Grantor's property, as described above.

Nothing herein contained shall be construed as authorizing the Grantee, its successors or assigns to injure, damage, or remove any structure upon the lands of the Grantor adjacent to the above described easements, except as follows:

This easement is related to construction of the Carolina Harmony Trail, roadway, drainage, sidewalk, landscape, and other associated improvements shall be permanent.

The consideration set forth in this document shall be considered full compensation for the property, and for any diminution in value that may result to the remaining property by virtue of proximity to the project, such as: grade alignment, utility installation, or the alteration of drainage patterns and facilities.

Should one or more of the Grantors be natural persons not joined by their respective spouse, it is conclusively presumed that the land conveyed is not the residence or business homestead of such Grantor. Should one or more of the Grantors be a legal entity other than a natural person, it shall be conclusively presumed that the person signing on behalf of that party has been duly and legally authorized to so sign and there shall be no necessity for a seal or attestation.







To properly and systematically account for expenses related to the storm for debris removal, emergency operations and repairs and system repairs, a Project Budget Ordinance is necessary.

The recommendation from staff is to approve the attached project budget ordinance for the Hurricane Helene FEMA grant awarded.

ORDINANCE NO. 63-2024

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A CAPITAL PROJECT ORDINANCE AND BUDGETS FOR THE CITY OF SHELBY'S STORM HELENE FEMA GRANT PROJECT

WHEREAS, in accordance with applicable provisions of the North Carolina Budget and Fiscal Control Act, the City of Shelby finds it advisable and necessary to establish a capital project ordinance and budgets for the City of Shelby's Storm Helene FEMA Grant Project; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the City to establish a budget for this capital project and appropriate applicable funds needed for the administration and construction of this project in order to comply with applicable provisions of the North Carolina Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act; and,

WHEREAS, G.S. 159-13.2 provides that a City may undertake municipal facility renovation, by way of a capital project ordinance providing the necessary balanced budget and funding for the life of the project;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHELBY, NORTH CAROLINA:

Section 1: This ordinance is to establish a budget for projects related to the Helene Hurricane Disaster Response (FEMA Disaster 4827) that will be reimbursed by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Public Assistance Program. Through its Public Assistance Program (PA), FEMA provides Federal grant assistance for debris removal, emergency protective measures, and the restoration of disaster-damaged, publicly owned facilities. Although FEMA typically covers 75% of the eligible costs, the federal government has increased the cost share in North Carolina for the Helene disaster to 100% for the first 180 days of the incident period. Expenses may be eligible for FEMA reimbursement in the following categories:

Emergency Work

Category A: Debris Removal -- Expenses related to clearing debris from public property, including roads, parks, and other infrastructure.

Category B: Emergency Protective Measures -- Costs for actions taken to protect public health and safety, such as: search and rescue operations; sheltering and evacuation; and medical care and emergency response.

Permanent Work

Category C: Roads and Bridges -- Repairs and restoration of transportation infrastructure, including highways, streets, and bridges.

Category D: Water Control Facilities -- Restoration and repair of drainage systems, levees, and other flood control measures.

Category E: Public Utilities -- Restoration of water, wastewater, electrical systems, and other essential public utilities.

Category F: Parks, Recreational Facilities, and Other -- Repair or replacement of parks, recreational areas, and public spaces.

Category G: Buildings and Equipment -- Repairs or replacements of public buildings, such as schools, community centers, and related equipment.

Administrative Work

Category Z: Management Costs -- Administrative costs related to the overall management of disaster response and recovery efforts, which are capped at a certain percentage of eligible project costs.

SUBJECT: Project Budget Ordinance Amendment – CHARP (Annex Project)

The City Hall Annex project has been underway since June 2024. They have progressed well and are on-site almost every working day. During some of the demolition work, a wall covering was removed from portions of the exterior masonry walls and several significant cracks were found. A structural engineer was contacted to come out to look at the cracks.

Cracks were observed in the brick veneers in the corners of the building due to a lack of expansion joints. Cracks were also found in the concrete masonry on the upper floor. This was determined to be caused by a lack of steel reinforcement within the walls. To remedy this, the inside face of the block will need to be slotted, have rebar installed, and then filled with grout. This will need to be placed on both floors, from the roof elevation down to the first-floor slab. New expansion joints will also be installed. This work should have been done during the initial construction of the building but was not completed.

I recommend approval of the attached PBA to cover the cost of this additional work. This will make the building structurally sound and safe for future occupancy.



1. Cracks in veneer at corners.

This type of crack is due to expansion of the brick veneer. Full height vertical expansion joints are typically installed on brick veneer buildings at opening locations, at building corners and a maximum of 20'-0" o.c. This building doesn't have any expansion joints. I recommend installing new vertical expansion joints at all corners. These joints should extend all the way through the veneer and be caulked with an expansion joint sealant. Existing cracks should be repointed and/or sealed to prohibit water intrusion. It doesn't appear expansion joints are required at the other typical areas as mentioned above at this time. If in the future, new expansion cracks appear, additional joints may be required.

2. Horizontal cracks in the CMU

The upper floor has horizontal cracks approximetly 2'-0" and/or 3'-4" off the floor. These cracks transition into a stairstep type cracks at the building corners. The cracks are stress cracks due to the wall bowing inward from wind load. The reason for this is because the walls don't have any steel reinforcement. To repair the walls, the inside face of the block shall be slotted enought to install #4 bars at 48" o.c. Cells with new bars shall then be filled with grout. Reinforcement shall extend from roof elevation down to second floor elevation. Even though the first floor doesn't have cracks, it is recommended to continue the reinforcement to the first floor slab as well. At the new stair openings where walls are 2 story, a new #6 bar at 24" o.c. shall be installed from roof elevation down to the first floor elevation

3. Vertical crack in CMU

The rear wall has a vertical crack from the second floor up to the roof. This is an expansion crack. This is due to a combination of no vertical control joints and no horizontal joint reinforcement. I recommend filling joint with an expansion type sealant. New #4 vertical bars as detailed in item number 2 should be installed within 2'-0" of both sides of this crack. This crack should be monitored for additional movement over time. More drastic repair methods, such as full block width control joints and/or horizontal reinforcement may be required in the future.

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PREFACE

To the citizens and the governing body of the agency: This report represents a thorough review of the organization to verify and validate how this agency is executing its stated mission in accordance with universally accepted practices for a contemporary fire and emergency services organization. Quality improvement can only be initiated and realized by those agencies that challenge themselves through a comprehensive self-assessment. This report documents that this agency is seeking organizational improvements and discovering elements of excellence. Please note that the recommendations by the peer assessment team are opportunities for improvement provided from professionals in the fire and emergency service industry.

To the agency: This report communicates the outputs and outcomes of your dedication and commitment to quality improvement. Your self-assessment, community risk assessment/ standards of cover, and strategic plan amount to years of work to understand your community, establish accountable goals, institute transparency, and factually comprehend what you did not know about your organization. The verification and validation of your agency by a team of peers represents a major accomplishment. The recommendations in this report are opportunities to become better and stronger in your community. Finally, take this report and communicate to your community the areas you identified during your self-assessment that were outstanding and those that represent improvement opportunities.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) is a career organization with 56 uniformed personnel, staffing three fire stations within the city. These stations house 16 firefighters per shift deployed on 4 fire apparatus composed of 2 engine companies, a squad company which responds on a quint apparatus and operates primarily as an engine company but may operate as a ladder company as operations require, a ladder/heavy rescue company, and 1 battalion chief. All apparatus are staffed with a minimum of three firefighters and equipped to provide non-transport basic life support (BLS). The primary provider of basic and advanced pre-hospital emergency care and transport in the county is provided by Cleveland County Emergency Medical Service. The department operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week with a minimum of 14 personnel. The number of personnel dedicated to community risk reduction/public fire education is four full-time personnel in the fire marshal's office. One full-time person is dedicated to fire training.

The city covers just over 22 square miles and is located in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains in the southwestern part of North Carolina. The city is the county seat of Cleveland County, North Carolina and was chartered in 1843. The historic city is about 45 miles west of Charlotte, North Carolina. The 2020 census indicated a population of 21,918.

The Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI) has completed a comprehensive review and appraisal of the Shelby Fire & Rescue agency based upon the tenth edition of the accreditation model. The commission's goals are to promote organizational self-improvement and to award accreditation status in recognition of good performance. The peer assessment team's objectives were to validate the department's self-assessment study, identify and make recommendations for

improvement, issue a report of findings, and conclude if the department is eligible for an award of accreditation.

The peer assessment team followed CFAI processes and City of Shelby Fire & Rescue demonstrated that its self-study accreditation manual, community risk assessment/standards of cover (CRA/SOC), and strategic plan met all core competencies and criteria. The peer assessment team recommends accredited agency status for City of Shelby Fire & Rescue from the Commission on Fire Accreditation International.

The peer assessment team observed a strong commitment by the agency to the CFAI accreditation process and to ensuring appropriate succession training for the accreditation manager position. The agency wants to establish a dedicated position within the organization to manage the accreditation process. The current accreditation manager regularly acts as peer assessor and the fire chief acts as a peer team lead for CFAI. These approaches ensure continuity, more direct access to quality improvement with similar organizations, and the engagement of a broader spectrum of the department.

The peer assessment team had a meeting with the city manager who expressed a long-standing interest in the process. There is clearly a commitment to continue to follow and support the implementation of identified opportunities for improvement. It can be anticipated that all representatives will be supporters and network participants as the full benefits of going through the self-assessment process are realized and built on in the future.

The peer assessment team identified opportunities for improvement that are provided below. These recommendations flowed from discussions, interviews, and a review of supplied documentation to support its self-assessment conclusions.

The following represents a synopsis of the recommendations that were made by the peer assessment team during the on-site visit. Additional details for each of these recommendations can be found in the Observations Section of this report. For each of the recommendations, the performance indicator from the model is provided, including notating if it is a core competency (CC).

Recommendations

Recommendations were developed from the evaluation of criterion, core competencies, and performance indicators.

- 1. It is recommended that the agency evaluate and document outcomes for non-fire risk events. (2B.3)
- 2. It is recommended that the agency evaluate, and adjust if needed, effective response force benchmarks to ensure they are reflective of desired performance. (CC 2C.5)
- 3. It is recommended the agency seek adoption of its community risk assessment/standards of cover by the city council. (2D.8)
- 4. It is recommended that the agency develop a plan to provide updates on progress and completion of goals and objectives to the community. (3D.3)

- 5. It is recommended that the agency update its all-hazards plan to reflect the recent changes to emergency management operations facilities and current practices. (5D.1)
- 6. It is recommended that the agency further develop a continuity of operations plan (COOP) for the city that addresses operational needs beyond personnel. (5D.6)
- 7. It is recommended that the agency develop a process for the collection, documentation, storage, and security of patient care records. (5F.7)
- 8. It is recommended that the agency evaluate the location of fitness equipment as part of its carcinogen-exposure reduction efforts. (6B.1)
- 9. It is recommended that the agency evaluate the current system for performing maintenance and implement a system that has a systematic or planned approach to address facility needs. (6B.2)
- 10. It is recommended that the agency work with their automatic aid agencies and establish a plan for joint training when developing future annual training plans. (8B.2)
- 11. It is recommended that Shelby Fire & Rescue continue to work with the Cleveland County Communications Center to analyze call processing times in the records management system to identify areas for improvement. (9B.7)
- 12. It is recommended that the agency conduct a staffing analysis to ensure overall administrative functions reflect the needs of the agency. (CC9C.1)
- 13. It is recommended that the agency tailor its public information messaging to the intended audience to support the agency's perception in the community. (9C.2)
- 14. It is recommended the agency expand its formal review cycle process for all organizational documents. (CC9C.3)
- 15. It is recommended that the agency formalize an internal reporting process for near miss incidents and provide training for agency personnel to ensure the success of the program. (11A.6)

The department responded to a total of 2,352 emergencies in 2023 including: 427 fire calls (18.2 percent); 1,785 emergency medical service (EMS) calls (75.9 percent); and 140 miscellaneous calls (5.9 percent). Servicing these calls in 2023 resulted in a total of 5,132-unit movements.

In 2019, the Insurance Services Office (ISO) visited the city to rate its public protection classification. The outcome of the visit was an improvement of the public protection classification from Class 4 to Class 2. The results of the most recent visit in April of 2024 are pending.

The City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) has a very robust child car seat safety program. Forty-two front line personnel hold current car seat installation technician certifications. This number of personnel allows anyone in the community to visit any station at any time to ensure they have a properly installed car seat. In 2023, SFR was awarded the Child Passenger Safety Program of the Year award for the State of North Carolina.

OBSERVATIONS

Category 1 — Governance and Administration

The governing body and/or agency manager is legally established to provide general policies to guide the agency, approved programs and services, and appropriated financial resources. The City of Shelby is legally established under North Carolina General Statute, Chapter 160A. The city's ordinances define governmental function, service delivery and regulations including fire protection. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) was established on June 1, 1927, through the City of Shelby Code of Ordinances, Chapter 18, Fire Protection and Prevention. The city provides appropriate guidelines and fiscal resources for the agency to execute its mission.

The City of Shelby operates in a council-manager form of government which has six elected council members representing six wards throughout the city. An at-large mayor is also elected as a non-voting member of the council who serves as a tie-breaker if needed. The council appoints the city manager who is responsible for running the city's operations. The city manager is solely responsible for appointing all department heads, including the fire chief.

The organizational structure aligns with or supports the agency's mission, purposes, goals, strategies and objectives. The SFR administrative structure reflects the size, scope, and complexity of the organization, which provides an array of services to its response area. The city and agency have a well-developed set of job descriptions and an organizational chart that clearly defines the organizational structure.

Category 2 — Assessment and Planning

The agency collects and analyzes data specific to the distinct characteristics of its legally defined service area(s) and applies the findings to organizational services and services development. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) has documented and adopted service area boundaries that are legally established. The agency has automatic and mutual aid agreements that are reviewed and updated as necessary. The response area is divided into three districts and further segmented into planning zones that use the descriptive term of risk hazard zones. Risk hazard zones are defined utilizing population, land use, geography, non-contiguous incorporated areas, and census tracts. The agency segments the community into 68 risk hazard zones. This information has been utilized in determining new station placement for one additional station and the relocation of an existing station.

The agency identifies and assesses the nature and magnitude of all hazards and risks within its jurisdiction. Risk categorization and deployment impact consider factors such as cultural, economic, historical and environmental values, as well as operational characteristics. SFR has a documented and adopted methodology for classifying fire and non-fire risk in the agency's area of responsibility. The agency utilizes a model to score risk based on incident type, agency, community impact, and historical data. Both fire and non-fire risks have been identified and documented for each planning zone.

The agency monitors outcomes through fire loss and life loss data for fire events. However, outcomes for non-fire events are not identified. <u>It is recommended that the agency evaluate and document</u> outcomes for non-fire risk events.

The agency identifies and documents the nature and magnitude of the service and deployment demands within its jurisdiction. Based on risk categorization and service impact considerations, the agency's deployment practices are consistent with jurisdictional expectations and with industry research. Efficiency and effectiveness are documented through quality response measurements that consider overall response, consistency, reliability, resiliency and outcomes throughout all service areas. The agency develops procedures, practices and programs to appropriately guide its resource deployment.

SFR has a documented and adopted response strategy that provides consistent and reliable coverage to the service area. Benchmarks have been established for each risk classification and category of risk. The agency measures performance against the benchmarks for all risk classifications for both fire and non-fire incidents. Total response time components have been defined and documented. Critical tasking is identified for all risk categories, and data analyses recognizes critical tasking benchmark and baseline statements.

The agency is currently outperforming several benchmarks, most notably in the effective response force for moderate and high-risk emergency medical service incidents. <u>It is recommended that the agency evaluate</u>, and adjust if needed, effectives response force benchmarks to ensure they are reflective of desired performance.

The agency has assessed and provided evidence that its current deployment methods for emergency services appropriately address the risk in its service area. Its response strategy has evolved to ensure that its deployment practices have maintained and/or made continuous improvements in the effectiveness, efficiency and safety of its operations, notwithstanding any external influences beyond its control. The agency has identified the impacts of these external influences and communicates them to the authority having jurisdiction.

SFR's service delivery performance is monitored on a weekly, monthly, and annual basis to maintain and improve emergency response. Performance gaps are identified and response opportunities for improvement are evaluated and implemented in accordance with the adopted response model. The agency embraces the continuous improvement model and continues to develop their data analytics capabilities. The fire chief meets with the city manager on a regular basis to ensure any performance gaps are communicated in a timely fashion.

The fire chief updates the city manager and city council to keep the elected officials apprised of any issues with the agency. The elected officials are provided a copy of the standard of cover as well. However, the city council has not formally adopted the standard of cover. It is recommended the agency seek adoption of its community risk assessment/standards of cover by the city council.

Category 3 — Goals and Objectives

The mission, vision and values of the agency are incorporated into a strategic plan. Once a strategic plan is in place and resources are available, the strategic plan provides direction, determines initiatives, and guides the goals and objectives of the agency. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) has a five-year strategic plan with established goals and objectives that direct the agency's priorities in a manner consistent with its mission, vision, and values. SFR's strategic plan has six goals. All goals have objectives providing direction, guidance, and timeframes.

The strategic plan was created in 2022 with an addendum added in 2023. Agency members at all levels were included in its development to ensure it included all divisions and programs. Upon completion, the plan was adopted by the city council and reviewed by the city manager as the authority having jurisdiction.

The strategic plan defines the agency's general goals and S.M.A.R.T. (specific, measurable, attainable, realistic and time-bound) objectives, directs its activities in a manner consistent with its mission and is appropriate for the community it serves. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue's strategic plan defines and establishes direction for all department members that are involved in the accomplishment of their goals and objectives, and ensures they are consistent and appropriate for the community it serves.

S.M.A.R.T. goals and objectives have been established that measure the effectiveness of the six strategic plan goals using metrics and key performance indicators. Stakeholder input was also used to determine gaps and issues in the department's performance and service delivery. Multiple community meetings have been held to survey external stakeholders' input to determine the effectiveness of the department's goals and objectives. Internal stakeholder input for the department's goals and objectives was obtained through stakeholder input, surveys, and meetings. The agency evaluates the goals and objectives in its regular planning meetings.

The agency uses a management process to implement its goals and objectives. SFR has established a management process for implementation of goals and objectives utilizing a periodic program review procedure. All goals and objectives are assigned to managers throughout their completion. Progress on objectives and tasks are monitored monthly as an agenda item in the chief officer's staff meetings.

All members of the department have access to both the strategic plan and the addendum via a hard copy in each station's library, in addition to digital format on the city and agency's intranet. All staff members received briefings explaining the goals and objectives and provided additional input related to strategic goal development.

Processes are in place to measure and evaluate progress toward completion of goals and objectives and overall plan performance. The goals and objectives are re-examined and modified periodically. SFR has processes in place to measure and evaluate progress towards completion of specific goals, objectives, and overall system performance. Multiple levels of personnel are involved in the measurement and tracking of the strategic goals to ensure the highest level of service possible is being delivered to the community.

The agency evaluates its administrative and operational processes using the Commission on Fire Accreditation International's (CFAI) self-assessment format. The agency's monthly meeting agendas follow the category and programming formulation contained in the *Quality Improvement for the Fire and Emergency Services* book. Additionally, the CFAI annual compliance report is used as a tool for evaluating administrative and operational processes and is submitted to the city manager annually.

The agency provides progress reports on the goals and objectives to city management through the fire chief's meetings with the city manager, in addition to providing an update to the city council at their annual planning retreat. The agency has not provided the community with progress updates on the goals and objectives. It is recommended that the agency develop a plan to provide updates on progress and completion of goals and objectives to the community.

Category 4 — Financial Resources

Agency planning involves broad staff and community participation in financial planning and resource allocation. The agency's financial planning and budget process reflects sound strategic planning and a commitment to its stated goals and objectives. The agency prepares a balanced budget, which adequately maintains level of service and personnel resources. The City of Shelby's operational and capital budgeting processes follow established state law and city ordinances. The city's finance director and city manager are responsible for developing a recommended budget for the city which includes City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR). The city uses a zero-based budget process that begins in November with all departments assembling budget requests for the upcoming fiscal year which runs from July 1st to June 30th. Department heads meet with the finance director and city manager to review funding requests. The city manager assembles these requests and develops a recommended budget for the city. This recommended budget is available to the public for comment when provided to the city council. Budget hearings are held in April and May of each year where the manager's recommended budget is reviewed by the city council. By June 30th, a balanced budget will be submitted for adoption that takes effect July 1st.

Agency financial management demonstrates sound budgeting and control, proper recording, reporting and auditing. The City of Shelby utilizes proper financial controls in budgeting and expenditure. The local government and fiscal control act as outlined in North Carolina General Statute 159, requires the city to publish complete financial statements. These statements are audited annually by an outside accounting firm to ensure accuracy and adherence to generally accepted accounting practices. In 2022, the city received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting (certificates) from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) of the United States and Canada for its Budget and their Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR). dated June 30, 2022. The city has received this certificate for the last 25 consecutive years. The city currently has an A1 bond rating for any debt issuance.

Appropriately allocated financial resources support the organizational mission, stated long-term plan, goals and objectives and maintain the quality of programs and services. The city allocates funding for City of Shelby Fire & Rescue through the general fund as is done with non-utility city departments. Funding for city utilities is a separate process handled through the enterprise fund. The fire chief solicits input from staff, historical experiences, and future initiatives to formulate budget requests for the coming year. The chief then submits annual funding requests for the agency that support the mission of the organization to the city manager to be considered for funding in the city operating budget.

The city does not utilize any one-time or grant funding sources for operational costs. An eight percent reserve fund is maintained by ordinance. The city has a policy that outlines what constitutes a capital expenditure that may require one-time funding sources. On occasion, the city will issue debt for large capital projects.

Category 5 — Community Risk Reduction Program

Criterion 5A – Prevention Program

The agency operates an adequate, effective and efficient program as identified in the community risk assessment and standards of cover. The approach is comprehensive and includes both prevention and

mitigation strategies such as life safety, hazard risk reduction, plan review, code compliance, and the detection, reporting and control of fire and non-fire risks. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue's (SFR) prevention program is coordinated through the fire marshal's office, which employs a full-time fire marshal and three inspectors/investigators. The inspector-investigators work a 24-hour shift, consistent with the operations staff. The city has adopted the North Carolina State Building and Fire Prevention Codes and enforces all applicable laws which are locally enforced through the City of Shelby's code of ordinances, chapter 18 - Fire Prevention and Protection. The agency works with the city's building department on new construction and inspection duties. The peer assessment team noted that the agency has a great working relationship with the building official and department staff during the site visit. They work together to ensure that safety requirements are met, and reviews and inspections are completed on time. Communication lines are open and allow for quality work to continue throughout the city.

Criterion 5B – Public Education Program

A public education program is in place and directed toward reducing community risks in a manner consistent with the agency's mission and as identified within the community risk assessment and standards of cover. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue provides a robust public education program to the City of Shelby. The agency runs the program through the fire marshal's office with a staff of four. These personnel are augmented by operations personnel that hold fire and life safety education certifications that allow these individuals to regularly participate in the delivery of programs.

The agency has partnerships with several organizations throughout the area that support the mission of the agency's public safety education programs. These organizations include Atrium Health-Safe Kids Cleveland County, Cleveland County Health Department, and the City of Shelby Police Department. In 2023, the agency received the Child Passenger Safety program of the year award for the state of North Carolina for their car seat installation program.

Criterion 5C – Fire Investigation, Origin and Cause Program

The agency operates an adequate, effective, and efficient program directed toward origin and cause investigation and subsequent classification of fires, explosions, and other emergency situations that endanger life or property to drive community risk reduction activities. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue's fire investigation, origin, and cause program is coordinated through the fire marshal's office. The fire marshal's office is staffed with one full-time fire marshal and three full-time inspector-investigators. The fire inspector-investigators work a 24 hours on-duty/48 hour off-duty schedule and are available city-wide for investigations. Each member of the fire marshal's office holds fire investigation credentials through the North Carolina Office of the State Fire Marshal and/or the International Association of Arson Investigators (IAAI). The agency is also supported by the Shelby Police Department for any investigation that involves serious injury or death and suspected criminal activity.

The agency utilizes the current edition of National Fire Protection Association 921: *Guide for Fire and Explosion Investigations*, state statues and city code ordinances to guide fire investigations. The fire investigators have appropriate access to both state and federal resources as needed.

Criterion 5D – Domestic Preparedness Program

The agency operates an all-hazards preparedness program that includes a coordinated multiagency response plan designed to provide the community preparedness and resiliency in response to terrorist threats or attacks, major disasters, and other large-scale emergencies occurring at or in the immediate area. The City of Shelby maintains an all-hazard domestic preparedness program that is compliant with the National Incident Management System. The City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) fire marshal is designated as the city's emergency management coordinator. The fire marshal works closely with the Cleveland County Emergency Management Agency to ensure the city is prepared for a significant event within the city. The county maintains an emergency management plan and a continuity of operations plan. Both plans were updated in 2022. Exercises are conducted to test these plans which include the city.

The city has a published all-hazards plan. However, the plan has not been updated to reflect the most current operational practices and job titles. It is recommended that the agency update its all-hazards plan to reflect the recent changes to emergency management operations facilities and current practices. The city maintains a continuity of operations plan to address personnel needs. However, the existing plan does not address needs for facilities, equipment, technology, and infrastructure. It is recommended that the agency further develop a continuity of operations plan (COOP) for the city that addresses operational needs beyond personnel.

<u>Criterion 5E – Fire Suppression Program</u>

The agency operates an adequate, effective, efficient and safe fire suppression program directed toward controlling and/or extinguishing fires to protect the community from injury or death and reduce property loss. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue's (SFR) methodology utilized for fire suppression data collection and analysis has resulted in the fire suppression program being subdivided into an additional criterion referenced in Criterion 5L - Non-Structural Fire Suppression. The fire suppression program is reflective of the structural fire response program of the agency. SFR responds from three fire stations within the city. These stations are staffed with 16 firefighters per shift deployed on 4 fire apparatus composed of 2 engine companies, a squad company which responds on a quint apparatus and operates primarily as an engine company but may operate as a ladder company as operations require, a ladder/heavy rescue company, and 1 battalion chief. The agency maintains its apparatus fleet and equipment consistent with the requirements set forth by North Carolina Response Rating System (NCRRS) and recognized industry standards. General operating guidelines are in place to direct the agency's staffing, apparatus deployment and response for all structural firefighting operations.

The agency utilizes the National Incident Management System (NIMS) to manage assignments and resources for all structural fire responses. Annual NIMS refresher training is performed for all agency personnel to ensure proficiency is maintained. The agency deploys an incident safety officer on all structural fire responses. ICS is utilized daily and functions successfully at several larger scale local and regional events including the; American Legion World Series, the seventh inning stretch concerts, the Cleveland County Fair, and the Music Mush and Mutts Festival.

Monthly reports and program updates are reviewed at the chief officer's staff meeting. The fire suppression program is formally reviewed annually during the third quarter of the year. This format

has provided a mechanism for the agency to properly analyze the effectiveness of this specific program and the overall impacts with the agency's community risk reduction efforts.

Criterion 5F – Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Program

The agency operates an EMS program with a designated level of out-of-hospital emergency medical care that protects the community from injury or death. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) provides non-transport emergency medical services with four staffed fire apparatus companies deployed from three fire stations located within the city. The agency provides basic life support (BLS) care which is supplemented by an advanced life support (ALS) response from Cleveland County EMS (CCEMS). CCEMS operates an ALS ambulance out of all three agency fire stations. CCEMS is the only EMS transport agency for the city. The agency follows the North Carolina College of Emergency Physicians (NCCEP) protocols supplemented by certain specific additions for drug interventions and equipment provisions. Medical control and protocol oversight is maintained by the Atrium Health System in the county hospitals and implemented on scene by CCEMS. Recurring recertification training for agency personnel is also administered through CCEMS. All NCCEP protocols and local additions are reviewed, at a minimum, annually by the county medical director and CCEMS and updated as necessary.

The agency utilizes both online and offline medical control. When agency responders arrive prior to CCEMS personnel, offline medical control serves as the basis for initial patient care through standing orders. Once CCEMS personnel arrive, they assume patient care as the higher certified clinicians. Patient care records are collected, documented, and stored in accordance with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) regulations. All agency personnel receive annual HIPAA compliance training as part of the annual training program offered through the Cleveland Community College. The agency participates in a quality assurance review program managed by Atrium Health Systems and CCEMS.

City of Shelby Fire & Rescue has partnered with the Cleveland County EMS response agency to supply automatic external defibrillators (AED) for each emergency response vehicle. In 2018, the City of Shelby implemented a safety program placing an AED in each public, city-owned facility. Monthly reports and program updates are reviewed at chief officer's staff meetings. EMS program analysis and compliance is a monthly topic at these meetings. This format has provided a mechanism for the agency to properly analyze the effectiveness of this specific program and the overall impacts with the agency's community risk reduction efforts. A formal review is completed by the agency's EMS program manager.

State regulation and county medical protocol require the transport provider, CCEMS to properly collect, document, store and safeguard all pertinent patient information and records. The agency aids in gathering this information and at times performs care offline through standing orders. As CCEMS is responsible for patient records, patient information is passed along during incidents. However, patient care information collected by SFR personnel prior to CCEMS arrival is not maintained in SFR records. It is recommended that the agency develop a process for the collection, documentation, storage, and security of patient care records.

Criterion 5G – Technical Rescue Program

The agency operates an adequate, effective, efficient and safe technical rescue program directed toward rescuing the community from any life-endangering causes (e.g., structural collapse, vehicle accidents, swift water or submersion, confined space, cave-in, trench collapse). City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) responds to a variety of rescue calls and has an automatic aid agreement with Cleveland County Emergency Management (CCEM) for any additional assistance needed to meet the program's needs. The agency is well-equipped with the tools and resources needed. All staff is required to be certified as a North Carolina Rescue Technician. In addition, they are required to obtain at least one specialty certification within one year of employment.

The agency's technical rescue program maintains a strong relationship with the CCEM as they provide automatic aid to responses outside of the agency's capabilities. All operating companies can deliver technical rescue services, and the agency cross-staffs a heavy rescue apparatus for deployment.

It was verified and validated by the peer assessment team that Shelby Fire & Rescue had an insignificant number of maximum risk technical rescue incidents for 2019 - 2023, to provide a

sufficient data set to study. Therefore, no performance gap analysis for maximum risk is provided in this report.

Criterion 5H – Hazardous Materials (Hazmat) Program

The agency operates an adequate, effective, efficient, and safe hazardous materials program directed toward protecting the community from the hazards associated with the uncontrolled releases of hazardous and toxic materials. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) has general operating guidelines along with staffing policies that define the response for the hazardous materials program and incident response. All agency personnel are certified as North Carolina Hazardous Materials responders and are required to maintain certification at the operations level. In addition, many members hold technician level certification. The agency is supported by the Cleveland County Hazardous Material Response Team (CCHMRT) on maximum risk incidents. This response group is made up of responders throughout the county and maintains a cache of equipment and will support a response with a minimum of six additional responders.

SFR staff maintain re-certification training through both the agency and offerings delivered via the CCHMRT. All training meets the requirements listed by the North Carolina Office of the State Fire Marshal and the Insurance Services Office. Personnel receive an annual physical from the agency medical provider and must successfully pass such to maintain response status.

It was verified and validated by the peer assessment team that Shelby Fire & Rescue had an insignificant number of significant and maximum risk hazardous materials incidents for 2019 - 2023, to provide a sufficient data set to study. Therefore, no performance gap analysis for significant and maximum risk is provided in this report.

Criterion 5I – Aviation Rescue and Fire Fighting Services Program

The agency operates an adequate, effective, efficient and safe aviation rescue and firefighting program directed toward protecting the community from an aviation accident or incident occurring at or in the immediate area. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) provides an adequate, effective, efficient and safe aviation rescue and firefighting program to the Shelby-Cleveland County Regional airport. The 5,002 foot runway is owned and operated by the City of Shelby and serves corporate and general aviation air traffic. The agency is responsible for responding to and mitigating all emergencies occurring on airport property. Aircraft crashes, in-flight emergencies, fuel spills,

hydraulic landing gear failures, smoke, or fire aboard inflight aircraft, are examples of aviation type emergencies the agency is prepared to mitigate following general operating guideline (*GOG*) 505.1-Shelby-Cleveland County Regional Airport (GOG 505.1). The airport is not Federal Aviation Administration 14 CFR part 139 certified thus specialized aviation rescue and firefighting response vehicles are not required. The members of the agency are trained and certified to the North Carolina Office of the State Fire Marshal Airport Firefighter level.

The agency provides appropriate staffing through structural firefighting equipment and personnel. The agency annually reviews policy and procedures associated with the aviation firefighting and rescue response in *GOG 300.05-Service Delivery of Fire and Rescue Services – Aviation Rescue Firefighting* and *GOG 505.1- Shelby-Cleveland County Regional Airport*.

The agency has determined that the analysis and compilation of data and performance standards has been minimal due to the limited number of responses to the airport.

Performance Gap Analysis

It was verified and validated by the peer assessment team that Shelby Fire & Rescue had an insignificant number of aviation rescue firefighting incidents for 2019 - 2023, to provide a sufficient data set to study. Therefore, no performance gap analysis is provided in this report.

Criterion 5L – Non Structural Fire Suppression

The agency operates an adequate, effective, efficient and safe fire suppression program directed toward controlling and/or extinguishing fires to protect the community from injury or death and reduce property loss. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue's (SFR) methodology utilized for fire suppression data collection and analysis has resulted in the fire suppression program being subdivided into an additional criterion. Non- Structural Fire Suppression is reflective of the non-structural fire response program of the agency. This includes fires involving utility infrastructure, mobile property and wildland/interface areas.

City of Shelby Fire & Rescue responds from three fire stations within the city. These stations are staffed with 16 firefighters per shift deployed on 4 fire apparatus composed of 2 engine companies, a squad company which responds on a quint apparatus and operates primarily as an engine company but may operate as a ladder company as operations require, a ladder/heavy rescue company, and 1 battalion chief. Additionally, the department provides a brush unit for natural cover fire responses. General operating guidelines covering staffing and response provide the framework for this program. The brush unit and equipment are maintained at the Grover Fire Station (Station #1). Members assigned at this station respond with the brush unit in support of incidents where this resource is needed.

Over the past several budget cycles the agency has made significant purchases of wildland and urban-wildland interface firefighting equipment to aid with readily available resources for this type of response. Additional wildland resources are available through the North Carolina Forest Service. The program is reviewed annually through the process of data analysis and resourcing review during a scheduled time at the monthly staff officers meeting.

It was verified and validated by the peer assessment team that Shelby Fire & Rescue had an insignificant number of maximum risk non- structural fire suppression incidents for 2019 - 2023, to provide a sufficient data set to study. Therefore, no performance gap analysis for maximum risk is provided in this report.

Category 6 — Physical Resources

Development and use of physical resources are consistent with the agency's established plans. A systematic and planned approach to the future development of facilities is in place. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) works within the framework of adopted city plans, the agency's strategic plan, the city's capital improvement plan, and the annual fiscal budget to ensure that existing and planned physical resources can meet the agency's service delivery needs and community expectations. The agency operates out of three stations and is currently planning to relocate the existing Station 2 and add a new Station 4 in the western part of their service area.

The agency designs, maintains and manages fixed facility resources that meet the agency's goals and objectives. SFR has identified the need for new and replacement facilities, as identified in the city's capital improvement plan and strategic plan. Emergency response times, repairs to existing stations, and the economic climate dictate the need for additional facilities, which are evaluated regularly by the fire chief and city leadership.

Some of the fitness and workout equipment for the agency is maintained in apparatus bays as identifying dedicated fitness rooms can be challenging where fire stations were not originally designed with this need in mind. It is recommended that the agency evaluate the location of fitness equipment as part of its carcinogen-exposure reduction efforts.

City of Shelby Fire & Rescue maintains its facilities which are cleaned daily, by agency personnel as a part of their shift duties. Ground maintenance services are outsourced and cared for under an existing city contract. Each platoon is responsible for additional quarterly maintenance tasks,

including waxing assigned vehicles, cleaning building windows and other routine maintenance. Minor repairs to the facilities are also handled by agency staff. Major repairs are contracted to third-party contractors; these contracts are managed and coordinated through the professional development and logistics officer. Maintenance is performed as needed. However, there is no systematic or planned approach in place. It is recommended that the agency evaluate the current system for performing maintenance and implement a system that has a systematic or planned approach to address facility needs.

Apparatus resources are designed, purchased and maintained to adequately meet the agency's goals and objectives. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue apparatus and vehicles are appropriate for the operations, functions, and special operations in the community. The City of Shelby fleet facility is used for most of the repairs and maintenance of fire department vehicles. The fleet maintenance staffing is adequate for the department and the professional development and logistics officer has established a good working relationship with the garage supervisor to ensure that repairs are completed promptly. Minor repairs and routine maintenance are done in-house, while major repairs are outsourced to a contracted vendor. The agency has a system in place that is acceptable for their maintenance needs.

The inspection, testing, preventive maintenance, replacement schedule and emergency repair of all apparatus are well established and meet the emergency apparatus service and reliability needs. The city's Fleet Maintenance Division conducts routine and non-routine maintenance on all agency apparatus. The agency's use of iOps 360, a cloud-based operation management system, helps keep records and improves communication of repairs needed and the progress of repairs to completion. Third-party vendors have remained consistent, which provides ease in scheduling annual maintenance.

Equipment and supplies are adequate and designed to meet the agency's goals and objectives. Each company is supplied with the tools and equipment needed as determined by industry standards and agency policies. An inventory check list of equipment is completed every morning by the assigned personnel. The engineer is responsible for ensuring their apparatus and assigned equipment is in serviceable condition. The professional development and logistics officer is responsible for oversight of all apparatus and equipment for the agency.

Safety equipment is adequate and designed to meet agency goals and objectives. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue provides each employee with essential personal protective gear and station duty wear. Staff are issued all the necessary safety gear to meet Occupational Safety & Health Administration and National Fire Protection Association standards. All personal protective equipment is maintained per manufacturers' recommendations.

<u>Category 7 — Human Resources</u>

General human resources administration practices are in place and are consistent with local, state/provincial and federal statutory and regulatory requirements. The City of Shelby human resources (HR) department consists of a department director, an employment benefits manager, a safety and risk coordinator, and an employment coordinator. The staffing level has proven appropriate and effective to accomplish the city's human resource administrative functions. The human resources department maintains a current job description defining the credentials and qualifications for the director's position.

The City of Shelby maintains a personnel policy manual that is consistent with local, state, and federal requirements. Personnel policies and any changes to policies are approved by the director of human resources, city manager, and reviewed by the city attorney. Internal City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) policy is consistent with city policy.

Systems are established to attract, select, retain and promote qualified personnel in accordance with applicable local, state/provincial and federal statutory requirements. The City of Shelby has systems in place to attract, select, retain and promote qualified personnel in accordance with applicable local, state, and federal statutory requirements. The human resources department coordinates the processes for all entry level, lateral and promotional job opportunities across all city departments. The mechanisms that guide the identification and announcement of open positions are contained in the personnel policy manual and are administered by the HR department.

The agency's staff members are part of the recruiting process of attracting and evaluating candidates for employment with the agency. The fire chief and the human resources director solicit recruitment twice a year from the Cleveland County Community College's firefighter academy class. The agency uses internal assessors for its assessment center for the firefighter position. Additional members conduct all phases of the process including interviews, written exams, and evaluation of the physical ability test.

The HR department ensures that the employment processes, screenings, and qualification devices are job-related across all city departments and are consistent with requirements set forth in various sections of the City of Shelby personnel policy manual and meet current legal requirements.

The agency has a process in place to attract women and minorities to better reflect the demographics of the community. They have specifically used the Cleveland Community College's firefighter recruit academy to attract women and ethnic minorities. The agency's strategic plan developed the goal of creating a recruitment and retention committee. That committee was formed in 2017 and the department has budgeted for recruitment items based on the committee's recommendations.

The City of Shelby has an orientation process conducted by the HR department for all new members. All newly hired full-time or promoted employees with the City of Shelby serve a probationary period of six months as set forth in the *City of Shelby Personnel Policy Manual*. During the probationary period, members are evaluated to ensure they possess the core required knowledge, skills, and abilities for the position. Probationary staff members receive feedback concerning their progress and a performance evaluation is conducted at the end of the period for recommendation to regular status as a city employee.

The City of Shelby conducts exit interviews of all employees upon their separation. Exit interviews are voluntary, and the human resources department conducts them. The results of the interviews are shared with the department director and the city manager as feedback.

Documented personnel policies and procedures are in place to guide both administrative and personnel behavior. The City of Shelby policies, procedures, and rules are written and current with contemporary practice. The policies are consolidated within the *City of Shelby Personnel Policy Manual* and are communicated to all employees. The personnel policy manual has been maintained in written form, communicated to all city employees, and revised accordingly. The agency has maintained hard copy manuals in each of its three fire stations, in addition to maintaining an electronic copy on file on its intranet site.

Both the City of Shelby and SFR have policies that prohibit sexual, racial, disability, or other forms of harassment, bias, and unlawful discrimination of employees. The city and agency provide periodic refresher training on the policies. A plan is in place to annually review the policies with the human resources department and revise as needed.

There is a policy covering disciplinary action within the City of Shelby Personnel Policy Manual applicable to all city departments and employees. The policy outlines the general purpose of the policy, responsibility of supervisors, forms of discipline and guidelines for administering discipline. The City of Shelby maintains a position classification system administered and managed by the human resources department. In addition, the city maintains an appraisal system for all city employees to be evaluated at least annually in a pay for performance system.

Human resources development and utilization is consistent with the agency's established mission, goals and objectives. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue works closely with the City of Shelby's HR department for all human resources elements, including recruitment, testing for employment and promotion, in addition to training for current positions.

The City of Shelby encourages and actively seeks input from its employees through its employee bright ideas program. The agency has an employee recognition program in place in concurrence with the City of Shelby.

The agency has job descriptions in place for all positions and a written policy guideline for career development covering all position classifications through battalion chief. The agency plans to review the existing policy annually. The agency has a succession plan in place with a written policy outlined in GOG 203.03 - *Certification, Continuing Education & Development*.

A system and practices for providing employee/member compensation are in place. The City of Shelby's rates of pay and benefits are published and administered by the human resources department and are readily accessible to city employees. The City of Shelby offers a competitive compensation package for full-time employees that includes salary, a comprehensive health-care plan, enrollment in the local government retirement system, employer 401K contributions, longevity pay, paid vacation, and sick leave. The HR department publishes an employee benefits handbook that is updated annually consistent with any changes to the benefits package.

<u>Category 8 — Training and Competency</u>

A training program is established to support the agency's needs. The agency provides access to and guidance on educational programs that increase advancement potential and support the agency's needs. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) effectively identifies its training needs and establishes a training and recertification plan that meets the mission of the agency and the needs of all personnel. The professional development and logistics officer is responsible for the oversight of this program. General operating guidelines and state regulations help to guide the development of the training program. An agency training calendar is produced and made available annually. This calendar is readily accessible to all personnel via the agency *Outlook* calendar.

City of Shelby Fire & Rescue has established minimum qualifications and levels of training for all positions within the agency. New hire employees are provided with a workbook which guides their initial training and defines necessary competency skills to be completed within their first six months

of employment. Workbooks have also been created for relief drivers and relief captains as part of a career development path to prepare employees for advancement within the agency.

Training and education programs are provided to support the agency's needs. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue as multiple means for providing training and education for personnel. As part of the development of the annual training calendar, the agency ensures that all needed recertification hours and Insurance Services Offices (ISO) recommended hours are met for each position description. This process is outlined in the agency's general operating guidelines. The training and education programs made available by the agency have proven to be successful in providing access to needed training opportunities which allow SFR members to remain proficient with their skills.

The agency partners with the Cleveland County Community College to utilize the Brown Emergency Training Center. This training center offers a wide variety of fire and rescue scenario props including access to live-burn activities. The professional development and logistics officer for the agency and the support representative from the college work to schedule availability for agency crews and personnel to have access to the facility. Instructors from the college and the agency lead the training that takes place at this facility. Crews often can reach out to the college and secure the facility on short notice for additional training and drills as needed.

The Cleveland County Emergency Medical Services (EMS) department manages much of the EMS training and recertification for the agency. This is done through both didactic and practical training designed to meet the needs of the agency and its personnel and to complete the needed recertification hours to maintain licensure all agency emergency medical technicians.

The agency also provides internal training opportunities for personnel through agency instructors that cover a broad subject area. Personnel train daily both individually and as part of their company. All training is documented within *EPR Fireworks*, the agency's records management system and *Vector Solutions*. Cleveland County EMS utilizes *Vector Solutions* for tracking all EMS training. Agency personnel have access to each system and can readily check their status regarding current training hours completed.

The agency receives automatic aid from multiple county agencies for maximum risk responses in several community risk programs. This response brings additional physical resources and personnel to the incident scene which aids in more timely incident stabilization and mitigation. However, training with these aid agencies fell off during the pandemic. It is recommended that the agency work with their automatic aid agencies and establish a plan for joint training when developing future annual training plans.

Printed and nonprinted training and education resources, library materials, media equipment, facilities and staff are available in adequate quantity, relevancy and diversity, and are current. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue has provided access to relevant training materials for all personnel through multiple avenues. The agency maintains a small training library containing current publications of fire service training materials in the office of the professional development and logistics officer. These include International Fire Service Training Association (IFSTA) manuals, National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standards and fire service industry periodicals. Along with this, the agency provides an online subscription to the NFPA codes. Staff members can access current editions of the code online anywhere they have access to an internet connection. Last, personnel have access to a wide variety of training and instructional materials via *Vector Solutions*.

The facilities and equipment utilized by the agency meet the training needs for personnel and are maintained and upgraded or replaced on a schedule as needed. The facilities and equipment located at the Cleveland County Community College provide additional training resources for agency personnel and these are satisfactorily maintained by the college.

<u>Category 9 — Essential Resources</u>

Criterion 9A – Water Supply

The water supply resources are reliable and capable of distributing adequate volumes of water and pressures to all areas of agency responsibility. All areas meet fire flow requirements in accordance with applicable fire flow criteria. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) water supply resources are reliable and capable of distributing adequate volumes of water and pressures to all areas throughout its jurisdiction. The agency adopts the North Carolina Fire Code Appendix B to determine required fire flows. All current areas meet fire flow requirements in accordance with the North Carolina Fire Code for references for obtaining minimum fire flow requirements.

The City of Shelby's water system meets the minimum fire flow requirements for all structures in their coverage area. The water system has over 218 miles of water lines and four above-ground storage tanks. There is one main pumping station, an emergency back-up station, and an emergency inter-connection with the City of Kings Mountain's water system. The system is rated to pump 12 million gallons of water per-day. The community currently has a class 1 rating for water supply that was performed in 2019.

<u>Criterion 9B – Communication Systems</u>

The public and the agency have an adequate, effective and efficient emergency communications system. The system is reliable and able to meet the demands of major operations, including command and control within fire/rescue services during emergency operations, and meets the needs of other public safety agencies. The Cleveland County Communications Center (CCCC) is the primary dispatching agency and serves as one of the public safety answering points for City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR).

The department communicates in the field using a digital 800 megahertz (MHz) trunked radio system that is interoperable with all other public safety agencies in the City of Shelby and Cleveland County. The agency has a mobile radio in each apparatus in addition to assigned portable radios for each position on the apparatus. As a backup for loss of signal, the agency can operate on North Carolina's Voice Interoperability Plan for Emergency Responders (VIPER) 800 MHz radio system. Any buildings that pose a communications problem for the 800 MHz channels are addressed by all units switching to a line of sight or direct talk channel that functions well in those situations.

The CCCC can receive natural disaster notifications and weather updates from the North Carolina Division of Criminal Information and the National Weather Service's weather alerting system. The CCCC has been adequately designed and equipped to meet the department's needs. Emergency power is provided by an on-site generator and a secondary generator, both are tested regularly.

The agency has time-based objectives for alarm handling that includes a benchmark goal of alarm processing times of 90 seconds or less, 90 percent of the time for all emergent calls for service to the 911 center. SFR provides its desired benchmark goals to the CCCC director and managers which are

reviewed annually. The baseline call processing times are at a slightly higher level than desired. There is no delay in receiving the records management system (RMS) data from dispatch by the agency. It is recommended that SFR continue to work with the CCCC to analyze call processing times in the RMS to identify areas for improvement.

Cleveland County Communications has maintained a training program that ensures adequate, timely, and reliable emergency response. In addition, all employees have completed annual training requirements through the continuing dispatcher education program to maintain certification. Cleveland County Communications Center personnel are certified through the International Academies of Emergency Dispatch (IAED). The IAED program includes the emergency medical dispatch protocols and requires monthly quality assurance reviews.

Cleveland County Communications has a backup plan and a continuity of operations plan approved by the North Carolina 911 Board that meets the general statue requirements for communications in North Carolina. The plan has two tiers of activation based on disruption or failure type to ensure continuity of service to both citizens and responders. This plan is tested annually as required by state statute.

The CCCC has a formal and documented appraisal plan in place. That plan is used to determine the effectiveness of the system and personnel. The agency works with the CCCC Director to ensure that the communications center remains effective for the operations of SFR.

Criterion 9C – Administrative Support Services and Office Systems

Administrative support services and general office systems are in place with adequate staff to efficiently and effectively conduct and manage the agency's administrative functions such as organizational planning and assessment, resource coordination, record keeping, reporting, business communications, public interaction and purchasing. City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) executive administration functions encompass financial management, human resource management, facilities management, fleet services maintenance, training and education, code enforcement and investigation, and fire and rescue operations. There is currently one administrative assistant who has been in place for about 18 months, the position was vacant for several years previously. This employee is an essential component that handles an abundance of the general office systems. The agency's administrative functions currently meet its needs. However, with the anticipated growth of the agency, the current resource allocation to administrative support may be inadequate. It is recommended that the agency conduct a staffing analysis to ensure overall administrative functions reflect the needs of the agency.

The agency utilizes public information channels and external communications to provide community information. However, some messaging is not tailored to the public, possibly causing the intended message to be missed. It is recommended that the agency tailor its public information messaging to the intended audience to support the agency's perception in the community.

The fire chief is ultimately responsible for the oversight and accountability of the agency's operational documents. The agency utilizes Vector Solutions to track the review cycle of operating guidelines. Some documents outside of operating guidelines were not formally notated as reviewed within the cycle. It is recommended the agency expand its formal review cycle process for all organizational documents.

<u>Criterion 9D – Information Technology</u>

Information technology resources are in place with adequate staff to efficiently and effectively conduct and manage the agency's information technology functions, such as hardware and software implementation and maintenance and data analysis. Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) has multiple operating systems in place that assist in everyday business and operations and are adequate for the department's needs. The agency utilizes several comprehensive data-based management systems for day-to-day operations. The agency is knowledgeable about the systems in which they are operating. The city's information technology department employs two staff members and assists the agency with the purchase, installation, and training of all the agency's hardware and software. They are also available for technical assistance should the need arise. The staffing is adequate and meets the needs of SFR. The information technology department is up to date on all the policies and procedures as it relates to the agency's security and data governance.

In April of 2020 the city's computer infrastructure suffered a significant cyber-attack. Due to this, the IT department had to clear and reprogram every device attached to the network. The external hack caused numerous problems throughout the city while the IT department worked to restore and upgrade the network's protection. Since the cyber-attack, the IT department has moved more of the operational program to cloud-based systems and upgraded the firewalls, anti-virus programs, and intrusion prevention systems.

Category 10 — External Systems Relationships

The agency's operations and planning efforts include relationships with external agencies and operational systems that affect or may influence its mission, operations and/or cost effectiveness. Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) has developed and maintained effective relationships with external agencies at the local and state level that support their mission and operations while providing cost effective services to the community. As a part of the Cleveland County Firefighters Association, the department participates in a mutual aid agreement among the fifteen member agencies in Cleveland County.

The agency participates in the North Carolina Intra-State Mutual Aid Plan which coordinates mutualaid fire resource support from agencies across North Carolina. Additional state level relationships with the North Carolina Emergency Management and the State Bureau of Investigation.

The 2022 Strategic Plan identifies support programs, groups, and agencies which complement the service delivery of the agency in meeting its mission requirements. There is an agreement with Cleveland County Emergency Medical Service (EMS) to provide emergency medical technician (EMT) basic and advanced life support transport to the City of Shelby.

The agency maintains current agreements with those external agencies which support the identified programs. SFR maintains three automatic aid contracts in addition to mutual aid agreements and has been reviewing them at least annually during their budget planning process. In addition, the agency has a process in place of continually reviewing and measuring external agency performance and related contracts to ensure their validity and any needed additions, training, or funding. The agency's mutual aid agreements and automatic aid contracts provide support or specific assignments to accomplish their mission and service delivery. These automatic aid agreements include aircraft related incident and structure fires on airport property, confirmed commercial structures, apartment complexes, and to commercial properties on the west side of the city that would otherwise have extended travel time.

<u>Category 11 — Health and Safety</u>

The agency's occupational health, safety and risk management programs protect the organization and personnel from unnecessary injuries, loss, and liability. The health, safety, and risk management programs of City of Shelby Fire & Rescue (SFR) are managed by the City of Shelby safety, health and risk coordinator, a fulltime employee within the city Human Resources office. The fire marshal is the agency liaison for the city safety committee. The City of Shelby maintains a personnel policy manual which provides guidance and direction for reporting, addressing, and communicating workplace hazards and accidents. The safety committee meets regularly to address safety issues or concerns within the city. The fire marshal performs an annual inspection on all city facilities to ensure fire code compliance. The agency has specific general operating guidelines which further define the safety and health program for the agency.

All agency employees receive annual bloodborne pathogen and communicable disease training, and agency staff ensure that the agency maintains adherence to all agency and city procedures along with county medical protocols related to occupational exposure. New hires receive this initial training during their orientation period with the city. The agency is working with the city to ensure a city-wide administrative occupational health and safety policy is developed to support the existing agency policy.

Recently, the safety committee has begun a renewed effort to improve near-miss reporting throughout the city. The agency has utilized activities such as post-incident analysis to identify near-miss concerns on the incident scene but is also confident that many such concerns are missed during this opportunity or go unreported. Formal accident reporting for the agency meets expectations and is completed as required within policy. The agency, along with the City of Shelby, has identified areas to improve upon the near miss reporting in the city. It is recommended that the agency formalize an internal reporting process for near miss incidents and provide training for agency personnel to ensure the success of the program.

The agency has a well-developed practice guided by policy regarding personal protective equipment (PPE) cleaning and maintenance. Each agency employee has two different sets of PPE which are identified with different colors of reflective striping. The color coding is used to identify the correct PPE to be worn during even and odd months. All PPE is appropriately cleaned and decontaminated following exposure in a an IDLH atmosphere. Any PPE requiring repair is sent to a licensed shop for repair. Personnel exposure records are maintained as required by policy.

The agency deploys an incident safety officer to all significant and maximum risk incident responses. The professional development and logistics officer is designated to serve in this role. All other Chief Officers or the on-duty inspector may also serve in this capacity as needed. The Incident Safety Officer is dedicated solely to monitoring and gauging the overall work/scene environment for safe/unsafe conditions and is not formally included in operational support thus allowing the focus to be operational firefighter safety.

The agency has a wellness/fitness program for personnel. The agency specifies and communicates the provisions if employees/members do not comply with the wellness/fitness program. SFR requires pre-employment medical and physical fitness evaluations along with substance screenings to candidates who have successfully completed all pre-employment testing requirements. All personnel receive annual medical and fitness evaluations. Additionally, the agency performs random and

reasonable suspicion screenings for all personnel. Cancer, behavioral health and cardiac screenings are provided for all employees beginning with baselines at the initial point of hire. Fitness equipment is provided at each fire station to include some type of cardio machine and strength training equipment. Personnel are allowed time on shift to complete physical exercise with the discretion of the company officer concerning the specific time. Physical fitness instruction is offered to each employee during the time of their annual physical and medical evaluations which are performed through a third-party vendor. Fitness and exercise education is also provided through the City of Shelby Wellness Committee.

The agency offers member assistance for behavioral counseling services. These are provided through the City of Shelby Employee Assistance Program (EAP) and generally managed through the human resources department.

Agency policy has been in place for over a decade that guides the health and wellness programs for the agency. The agency remains proactive with program evaluation and makes additions and improvements as needed. The program is formally reviewed annually by agency staff.


City Manager's Recommendation / Comments




Airport Development Background

Background

As noted in the detailed memo from Jack Poole, Airport Supervisor dated October 25, 2024, the City of Shelby has received an economic development grant from the NCDOT – Division of Aviation for \$1,235,273 for the site preparation related to a corporate hangar construction project. The City was approached by Fast Aircraft Supplies, Inc. from Spartanburg, SC in February 2024 about the potential for them to construct a 100' x 100' corporate hangar to conduct their avionics business in. In this situation, the City needs to provide a graded building pad and other site and utility improvements to allow for the private company to then construct the hangar building at their own expense.

The NCDOA has limited funds available for use across the state for justified and beneficial economic development projects. Mr. Poole and Brandon Ruppe (City Economic Developer) worked diligently with the NCDOA to obtain support for the project and to determine through a benefit-cost analysis, that the City was eligible for \$1,235,273 of state grant funding. It is important to note that this economic development funding is 100% grant funding with no local match required.

City staff have prepared a Project Budget Ordinance and Resolution for City Council consideration that establishes a budget for this project and authorizes the submittal of the application and associated documents for this economic development grant.

After submittal of this application to the NCDOA, the City will then receive a grant agreement for execution. Following approval of execution of the grant agreement at a subsequent City Council meeting, W.K. Dickson will be able to proceed with the design/bidding of this project.

It should be noted the that the continued support of the NC Division of Aviation and dedicated work by City staff allow the Shelby-Cleveland County Regional Airport to

continue to grow and better serve the needs of the aviation community in North Carolina.

Recommendation

City staff recommends that the Shelby City Council approve the Project Budget Ordinance and Resolution that have been prepared for this NC Division of Aviation economic development grant for corporate hangar development.

Background

In February 2024, a company named Fast Aircraft Supplies, Inc., based in Spartanburg, SC reached out to the City of Shelby showing interested in moving their business to North Carolina and building a hangar for the installation of avionics upgrades to aircraft. Fast Aircraft Supplies, Inc. would bring eleven (11) new jobs to our area with a minimum wage of \$43,564 annually. The estimated economic benefits for this company in our area would be \$11,040,000. They would provide additional services needed for local and regional aircraft owners. This project has been named "Project Fast." In May 2024, the City of Shelby applied for Economic Development Funds from the North Carolina Department of Transportation, Division of Aviation (NCDOA). A Benefit-Cost Analysis was completed by the NCDOA determining the maximum amount of funds that the City could receive for the project. The consultant for the Shelby-Cleveland County Regional Airport is W.K. Dickson. W.K. Dickson designed the scope of the project to fit the \$1,235,273 funding amount and provided a project schematic. There was a second Benefit-Cost Analysis performed by the NCDOA after the redesigned scope was submitted. On October 8, 2024, the North Carolina Department of Transportation, Division of Aviation awarded \$1,235,273 to the Shelby-Cleveland County Regional Airport for Project Fast. These funds would be 100% State funded with no local match required.

Review

Now that the NCDOA has sent the award letter, the City must submit the grant application to the NCDOA, sign the associated forms, and establish a Project Budget Ordinance in the amount of \$180,000 for the design/bidding phase services that W.K. Dickson will provide for the hangar related to Project Fast. The cost estimate and work authorization are attached to show the cost breakdown for the design/bidding services related to Project Fast. Upon approval of the submittal of the grant

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application, a grant agreement will be developed and signed by the City. W.K. Dickson can then begin the design of this project, which will take approximately four (4) months with an NCDOA review required before the project construction is sent out to bid. Once the project has been bid and a low bidder has been established, the construction of the project can begin. Construction will take approximately four (4) months from start to finish. The project will consist of grading, parking, vehicle access, apron improvements, utility extensions, and the construction of a 100'x100' hangar on the northeast side of the airport (see attached site plan).

Recommendation

City Staff recommends City Council approval to sign and submit the grant application, AV-508, and AV-509/AV-510 forms related to Project Fast so that this project can move forward as planned.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Shelby-Cleveland County Regional Airport (OWNER) wishes to construct one new 100'x100' aircraft hangar that is to be occupied by Fast Aircraft Supplies, Inc. Fast Aircraft Supplies will perform maintenance and avionics in the new hangar and this development will bring 11 new jobs to the community. The proposed hangar will be located in the existing corporate hangar area, just northeast of the existing terminal building, as shown on Exhibit 1. The proposed hangar layout compliments the current Airport Layout Plan (ALP) that was approved on May 2,2023. This project will include the required site preparation consisting of embankment and the associated erosion control, extension of the existing asphalt apron to provide aircraft access to the new hangar, an asphalt auto access drive with parking on the side of the new hangar, power supply, water, and sanitary sewer service to the new hangar. The new hangar building will be designed and constructed by others. At the start of the design effort, WK Dickson (CONSULTANT) will confirm the site layout and hangar size with the OWNER. Once the layout is confirmed, the ENGINNER will proceed with the development of the bid documents.

Design shall be in accordance with the following FAA Advisory Circulars:

- 150/5300-13B: Airport Design
- 150/5320-6G: Airport Pavement Design and Evaluation
- 150/5340-1M: Standards for Airport Markings
- 150/5320-5D: Airport Drainage Design
- 150/5370-2G: Operational Safety on Airports During Construction
- 150/5370-10H: Standards for Specifying Construction of Airports

The scope of services below outlines project management and grant administration, survey,



geotechnical investigation, design, permitting, and bidding to be provided by CONSULTANT to assist the OWNER with this project. This scope of work and fee estimate includes the work that is known to be required for this project as defined below. All professional consultants and subconsultants must be NCDOT pre-qualified or provide Evidence of Competency per FAA guidelines.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

Basic Services

The CONSULTANT will provide the Basic Services listed below and in accordance with Section I of the General Provisions of the Contract for Professional Services, dated August 8, 2024 (AGREEMENT).

- 1. Project Management and Grant Administration: Project Management and Grant Administration shall generally consist of project development; consultation with OWNER, state and federal government agencies to clarify and define the requirements for the project and review available data; coordination with subconsultants on administrative items; assistance to the OWNER with the administration of project applications, grant applications, grant compliance issues, routine status reports and correspondence and applications for funding reimbursements; and preparing and updating project budgets, project schedules, and cash flow forecasting for the duration of the project. Grant administration tasks will be in accordance with the most current aviation checklists on the NCDOA website.
- **2.** <u>Design and Plan Preparation:</u> The CONSULTANT will provide civil design phase services for Project Fast. FAA standard operating procedures will be follow if applicable. Services shall include:
 - a. Prior to the development of bid documents, CONSULTANT will confirm the new hangar dimensions and site layout geometry with the OWNER.
 - b. CONSULTANT will submit 30% & 60% drawings and 90% drawings and specifications to OWNER and NCDOA for review and approval prior to bidding. The anticipated list of drawings are as follows:
 - i. Cover & Index Sheet
 - ii. General Notes
 - iii. Construction Safety and Phasing Plans (CSPP)
 - iv. Existing Conditions and Demolition Plan
 - v. Site Layout Plan
 - vi. Plan and Profiles



- vii. Pavement Details
- viii. Grading, Drainage, and Erosion Control Plan
 - ix. Drainage Details
 - x. Storm Pipe Profiles
 - xi. Erosion and Sedimentation Control Details
- xii. Utility Layout Plan
- xiii. Sanitary Sewer Pipe Profile
- xiv. Utility Details
- c. Site visit to evaluate and confirm existing conditions.
- d. Prepare technical specifications.
- e. Prepare for review and approval by OWNER, his legal counsel and other advisors contract agreement forms, general conditions and supplementary conditions, and (where appropriate) bid forms, invitation to bid and instructions to bidders, and assist in the preparation of other related documents. Forms will include a listing of all sub-contractors. All sub-contractors must be NCDOT pre-qualified. The listing shall specify which ones are MBE/WBE/DBE's.
- f. Prepare an Engineers report, results of preliminary engineering evaluations for the manner that the work will be accomplished; and a project cost estimate based upon the final design. The report will follow the NCDOA guidance provided.
- g. Compile a 30% design package, submit to OWNER and NCDOA for review, and respond to review comments.
- h. Compile a 60% design package, submit to OWNER and NCDOA for review, and respond to review comments.
- i. Submit 90% drawings, specifications and cost estimate to OWNER and NCDOA for review and approval prior to bidding.
- j. Prepare final design, contract drawings, specifications and contract documents.
- k. Prepare erosion and sediment control permit application package and submit to NCDEQ.
- 1. Prepare and submit Construction Safety and Phasing Plan (CSPP) and required checklist to NCDOA for review. CONSULTANT will facilitate review process and address review comments to achieve NCDOA concurrence prior to submitting to FAA for 7460 for approval. The 7460 will be submitted and approved prior to construction.
- m. CONSULTANT will submit construction estimate to NCDOA for determination of minority



goal once design is complete and prior to developing bid documents and advertisements. DBE/MBE/WBE commitments or Good Faith Effort will be sent to NCDOA after bidding and prior to determination of the lowest responsible bidder.

- n. CONSULTANT will perform internal quality review of plans, specifications, and contract documents prior to advertising project.
- **Bidding Assistance**: The CONSULTANT will provide the following Bidding services for the Project Fast bid package:
 - a. Assist the Owner with advertising the project in accordance with FAA/State laws. The actual cost of the advertisements in the newspapers shall be paid for by the Owner.
 - b. Conduct a pre-bid conference in accordance with FAA Advisory Circular AC 150/5370-12B.
 - c. Answer contractor questions and issue addenda, if necessary.
 - d. Assist the OWNER in obtaining bids, preparing bid tabulations, and analysis of bid results and compliance with prequal requirements, and furnishing recommendations in connection with the award of construction contracts. The bid tabulation, Sponsor concurrence, Noncollusion affidavit, and list of all sub-contractors will be shared with NCDOA for review/approval prior to making contract award.
 - e. Assistance in preparation of formal contract documents for the award of construction contract.

If upon completion of bid advertisement and the pre-bid meeting additional solicitation and pre-bid meetings are required in order to solicit the minimum number of bidders this may be provided as an additional service.

4. <u>Documented CATEX</u>: Pursuant to Order 1050.1F paragraphs 5-6.4.a, e, f, and o., A Categorical Exclusion (CATEX) will be issued for the project and will be prepared in accordance with FAA Order 1050.1 Environmental Impacts: Policies and Procedures, FAA Order 5050.4, National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Implementing Instructions for Airport Actions and FAA Environmental Desk Reference for Airport Actions.

Review and approval of document will be performed by NCDOA. Documented CATEX will also include the following:

a. Completion of the ARP SOP 5.1 Appendix A "Documented CATEX" Form and generation of supporting Exhibits and documentation.



- b. Site Visit and field check will be completed by a certified wetland scientist to determine the presence or absence of Wetlands, Waters of the US and other applicable ecological resources. United States Army Corp of Engineers (USACE) and North Carolina Division of Water Resources (DWR) data forms will be completed for any Waters of the US or channelized drainage features within the project area.
- c. GPS positions will be recorded for any observed Waters of the US found onsite.
- d. Inter-agency scoping will be conducted to notify agencies of the proposed work and the existing resources within the project area in order scope anticipated impacts of the project. Scoping efforts include notification to the following agencies:
 - i. US Fish and Wildlife
 - ii. State Environmental Review Clearinghouse
 - iii. State Historic Preservation Office, SHPO
 - iv. United States Army Corps of Engineers (submittal of the forms of concurrence, as appropriate)
- e. Facilitate NCDOA review and respond to review comments. Package to include the wetlands data forms and subsequent permitting agency coordination; the Clearinghouse review submittal package and associated agency responses; and the coordination package submitted to FWS and the agency's response/determination.

Based on existing knowledge of the site, it is not anticipated that environmental determinations, a protected species survey or other formal regulatory agency coordination will be required. These items and any other item not listed above are excluded from this task.

Special Services

The CONSULTANT will provide the Special Services listed below and in accordance with Section II of the AGREEMENT.

Topographic Survey: Perform survey necessary to collect information needed for design of Project Fast. Survey will be completed by Lawrence Associates as a subconsultant to CONSULTANT. Subconsultant proposal and survey areas are shown in Attachment 'B'.

Information collected will generally consist of the following:

- a. Topographic survey at 1' contour intervals.
- b. Existing features including but not limited to, fencing, drainage features, pavement, dirt roads and path, above ground utilities, power poles, and property corners.



- c. Storm sewer and sanitary sewer locations and inverts within the survey area.
- d. Underground utility locations within the survey area (SUE quality level B).
- **2.** Geotechnical Investigation: Geotechnical testing will be conducted to evaluate existing subsurface conditions and determine design recommendations regarding subsurface soils, groundwater, site preparation and earthwork, hangar footing design, and pavements. Geotechnical investigation will be completed by ECS Southeast LLC, as a subconsultant to CONSULTANT. Subconsultant proposal is shown in Attachment 'C'.





ECS Southeast, LLC (ECS) is pleased to provide this proposal to perform a Subsurface Exploration and provide Geotechnical Engineering Services at the above referenced site. This proposal is based on our review of the provided project information and contains ECS' understanding of the project, proposed scope of services, activity schedule, fees, and authorization requirement.

PROJECT UNDERSTANDING

The subject site is located at 830 College Avenue in Shelby, Cleveland County, North Carolina. The subject site is within the parcel labeled as Cleveland County Parcel Identification Number (PIN) 3251-1-12L. Based on our review of available aerial imagery, the site appears to be paved drives, taxiways, and open fields adjacent to the existing hangars and taxiways. Based on our review of the provided site plan, ECS understands the proposed development will include the construction of a new corporate hangar structure within a footprint of approximately 10,000 square feet, taxiway apron, paved parking/drive areas, and a temporary sediment basin. No additional information has been provided to us.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

Soil Borings

Per your request, ECS will perform a total of nineteen (19) soil test borings as summarized below:

- Two (2) borings within the proposed building footprint to a depth of 20 feet.
- Ten (10) borings within the proposed apron, and parking/drive areas to a depth of 10 feet.
- Two (2) pavement cores with subgrade soil borings to a depth of 5 feet within the existing pavement areas.
- Five (5) borings within the anticipated sediment basin area to a depth of 10 feet.

The soil borings will be extended to the noted depths below the existing ground surface or auger refusal, whichever occurs first. Overall, up to <u>200</u> linear feet of soil drilling is proposed. Standard Penetration Tests, in general accordance with ASTM D1586, will be performed in each soil boring at 2½ foot intervals in the upper 10 feet and at 5 foot intervals thereafter. In conjunction with the penetration testing, split-spoon soil samples will be recovered at each test depth. Additionally, two (2) bulk soil samples will be

obtained from within the proposed pavement areas. The soil samples obtained during our subsurface exploration will be returned to our laboratory for visual classification and laboratory testing.

Site Access

Based on our review of available aerial photography from Google Earth, the site appears to be readily accessible to our drilling equipment. Therefore, mechanical clearing or difficult access have not been included in our scope of services or lump sum fee. However, coordination with airport personnel and limited traffic control (i.e. traffic cones at select testing locations) is anticipated and has been included in our lump sum fee.

Groundwater

Groundwater will be measured at the termination of drilling activities and the borings will be backfilled with the auger cuttings and asphalt cold patched, where applicable, prior to our demobilization from the site.

Laboratory Services

The laboratory services will consist of visual classifications of the soil samples by the project geotechnical engineer. These visual classifications will be used to generate the final soil Boring Logs that will be included in the engineering report. Additionally, laboratory testing for this project may include up to five (5) natural moisture content tests, five (5) percent fines tests, five (5) Atterberg limits tests, two (2) standard Proctor tests, and two (2) California Bearing Ratio tests. Laboratory testing will be performed in general accordance with ASTM Standards.

Report

Upon completion of the field and laboratory services, an engineering report will be produced. The report for this project will address the following:

- Information on site conditions including geologic information and special site features.
- Description of the field exploration and laboratory tests performed.
- Final logs of the soil borings and records of the field exploration and laboratory tests in accordance
 with the standard practice of geotechnical engineers. This includes a subsurface profile, site
 location diagram and boring location diagram.
- Measurement of the surficial organic laden soils, if encountered, at each boring location and notation of this information on the boring logs and in the text of the report. ECS can provide approximate grade elevation for the top of borings if a relevant topography survey is provided.
- Recommendations regarding foundation options for the structure and settlement potential. This
 will include bearing capacity information for shallow foundations or preliminary
 recommendations for the use of deep foundations (if soil conditions warrant). Settlement
 potential will be provided based on assumed loading and structure details from the project
 information obtained at the time of the analysis. Estimated loading information and structural
 detail will be required for a more detailed analysis.
- Recommendations regarding slab-on-grade construction and design.
- Seismic site classification per the North Carolina Building Code using the average N-value method.
- Light and heavy duty pavement section recommendations (passenger vehicular traffic), and hangar apron pavement section recommendations using obtained CBR test results and provided (or assumed if not available) traffic loading.



- Evaluation of the on-site soil characteristics encountered in the soil borings. Specifically, we will
 discuss the suitability of the on-site materials for reuse as Engineered Fill to support ground slabs
 and pavements. A discussion of groundwater, in-place fill, rock, and alluvial soils (if discovered)
 and their potential impact on structures and project construction will be provided.
- Recommendations for minimum soil cover during frost heaving, compaction requirements for fill and backfill areas, and slab-on-grade construction.
- Recommendations regarding site preparation and construction observations and testing.

PROPOSAL ASSUMPTIONS

ECS has made the following assumptions in developing this proposal:

- Client will provide or obtain right-of-entry for ECS to conduct our field services. Client will also provide a detailed, scaled site plan showing proposed and existing features if available.
- Field exploration (drilling) will be performed Monday through Friday during normal business hours. Additional fees will be required for field services required by the Client during off-hours or weekends. Also, we have not budgeted for delays (e.g., waiting for site access or contact personnel, time for meetings, etc.) once the drill rig arrives at the site.
- Care will be exercised to mitigate damage to lawn, landscape, pavement, soft ground and other
 areas that may be disturbed during the field exploration. Due to the weight of the drilling
 equipment, rutting of exposed subgrade, or cracking of existing pavements (i.e. roads, sidewalks,
 etc.) could occur in those areas traversed by the drilling equipment especially when the subgrade
 is wet. Our fee does not include time or expenses associated with the repair of ruts or damage.
- Excess soil cuttings generated from drilling activities will not be removed from the site by ECS.
 The boreholes will be backfilled with auger cuttings and asphalt cold patch, where applicable. If
 bentonite seals, grout, or additional asphalt patching are required, additional fees will be
 assessed. Excess soil cuttings will be left on site and placed in greenbelt areas, unless directed
 otherwise.
- Client will inform us of any known or suspected environmental site conditions which could affect
 the health and safety of our drill crew. We will report unusual odors and colorations of the soil
 or groundwater observed in the borings. Environmental sampling and analytical testing would be
 required to evaluate the presence or absence of contamination but is beyond the proposed scope
 of services.

Although ECS offers other services for the project, our proposed scope of services for this geotechnical evaluation does not include detailed recommendations for construction dewatering, excavation sheeting, allowable temporary slopes or erosion control; retaining wall design; pavement design; cost or quantity estimates; construction materials services; time for meetings; or a significant amount of consulting time after transmittal of our report. Additional project work not specifically addressed by this proposal shall be charged at a time and materials rate. Additional work, if required, shall be authorized by the client prior to initiation.

PUBLIC UTILITY CLEARANCE

ECS will contact North Carolina 811 (NC811) to locate underground utilities at the site; however, our experience indicates that NC811 normally will not locate private utilities. ECS will coordinate our soil boring locations in order to avoid underground utilities indicated by the NC811 locating system. Due to



the existing development at the site, the use of a private utility locator to attempt to locate private utilities within close proximity to the proposed testing locations (within about a 10 foot radius) has been included in our lump sum fee.

Contracting a private utility locator service is not a guarantee that all utilities within a work site will be identified, but a service that is offered to lower the risk of the owner/client. ECS and our clients have had past success in avoiding utility conflicts by augmenting the NC811 services with a private utility locator service utilizing Electromagnetic (EM) technology. EM locating can identify utility alignments that incorporate significant iron content in the conduit materials. However, private utilities possessing the higher likelihood of not being easily identifiable, beyond the point of distribution, include all utilities not containing significant ferrous (iron) content (examples would include but not be limited to most sanitary sewer alignments, copper or PVC water lines, fiber optic lines without tracer ribbon, copper electric lines with no surface exposure, drain tile/pipes, and irrigation lines). Additional location services such as Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR) are also available to augment the Electromagnetic (EM) locating services. Please let us know if you would like to discuss these additional services.

Where a private locator service identifies a potential risk that is not traceable through conventional methods, ECS will notify the client and work to resolve the issue. Additional costs related to the resolution of these potential conflicts will be invoiced per our unit rates or as negotiated and approved at the time of the occurrence.

SCHEDULE OF WORK

ECS can generally mobilize to the site for drilling within 5 to 7 days of receiving written authorization to proceed and utility clearance. Our field exploration is expected to require approximately 2 to 3 working days to complete, weather permitting. Laboratory testing is expected to require approximately 1 % to 2 weeks to complete. The engineering report will be provided to you within 2 to 3 weeks after completion of drilling and laboratory testing; however, verbal findings can be provided within 2 to 3 days after completion of drilling.

FEES

ECS will provide the proposed base geotechnical scope of services outlined herein for a lump sum fee of \$17,525 which includes the use of a private utility locator, asphalt coring, and asphalt coring/cold patch (where applicable). If unanticipated subsurface conditions are encountered that require modification to the proposed scope of services, you will be contacted for both your review and authorization.

SUMMARY AND ACCEPTANCE

Attached to this letter, and an integral part of our proposal, are our Terms and Conditions of Service. Our insurance carrier requires that we receive written authorization prior to initiation of work, and a signed contract prior to the release of any work product. 

Background

In February 2024, a company named Fast Aircraft Supplies, Inc., based in Spartanburg, SC reached out to the City of Shelby showing interest in moving their business to North Carolina and building a hangar for the installation of avionics upgrades to aircraft. Fast Aircraft Supplies, Inc. would bring eleven (11) new jobs to our area with a minimum wage of \$43,564 annually. The estimated economic benefits provided by NC Division of Aviation for this company in our area would be \$11,040,000. They would provide additional services needed for local and regional aircraft owners. This project has been named "Project Fast." In May 2024, the City of Shelby applied for Economic Development Funds from the North Carolina Department of Transportation, Division of Aviation (NCDOA). A Benefit-Cost Analysis was completed by the NCDOA determining the maximum amount of funds that the City could receive for the project. The consultant for the Shelby-Cleveland County Regional Airport is W.K. Dickson. W.K. Dickson designed the scope of the project to fit the \$1,235,273 funding amount and provided a project schematic. There was a second Benefit-Cost Analysis performed by the NCDOA after the redesigned scope was submitted. On October 8, 2024, the North Carolina Department of Transportation, Division of Aviation awarded \$1,235,273 to the Shelby-Cleveland County Regional Airport for Project Fast. These funds would be 100% State funded with no local match required.

Review

Now that the NCDOA has sent the award letter, the City must establish a Project Budget Ordinance in the amount of \$180,000 for the design/bidding phase services that W.K. Dickson will provide for the hangar related to Project Fast. The cost

estimate and work authorization are attached to show the cost breakdown for the design/bidding services related to Project Fast. Upon approval of the submittal of the grant application, a grant agreement will be developed by NCDOA for City Council acceptance. Following execution of the aforementioned agreement, W.K. Dickson can then begin the design of this project. The design process is anticipated to take approximately four (4) months with a NCDOA review required before the project construction is sent out to bid. Once the project has been bid and a construction contract has been awarded by City Council, the construction of the project can begin. Construction is anticipated to take approximately four (4) months from complete. The project will consist of grading, parking, vehicle access, apron improvements, utility extensions on the northeast side of the airport (see attached site plan).

Recommendation

City Staff recommends City Council approval to set up a Project Budget Ordinance in the amount of \$180,000 for the design/bidding services related to the site preparation to allow for construction of a corporate hangar for Project Fast as described above. The funds for this requested PBO are part of the \$1,235,273 awarded by the North Carolina Department of Transportation, Division of Aviation on October 8, 2024. As previously outlined, this grant funding is 100% state funding with no local match required.


