


## City of Shelby's Fire and Rescue Department Earns Reaccreditation and ISO 1 Class Rating



On Monday, June 17, 2024, Davie Summey, Division Chief of Inspection and Ratings for the North Carolina Office of the State Fire Marshal, presented the City of Shelby's Fire and Rescue Department with a certificate designating the newly awarded ISO Class 1 public protection rating at the Shelby City Council meeting. On August 7, 2024, Fire & Rescue Department representatives appeared at hearings before the Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI) during the Center for Public Safety Excellence's (CPSE) Summer Symposium in Atlanta, Georgia, for action by the commission on its application for accredited status. The commission unanimously approved accredited status for the City of Shelby Fire & Rescue Department. Accreditation is for a five-year term and candidate agencies complete a strategic plan, a community risk assessment, a self-assessment manual of over 240 performance indicators, and an on-site evaluation by industry peers. The Fire & Rescue Department has been accredited since 2014. 

# City Seeks Input for updated Comprehensive Plan






The survey will be open until the end of November, 2024, and the information gathered from the public will serve as an important piece of our comprehensive plan strategy.

# Fall Bulky Item Pick-Up Week

November 4-7, 2024





Fall Bulky Item Pick-Up Week was postponed due to Hurricane Helene, and the rescheduled dates are coming up soon! Bulky Item Pick-Up Week occurs twice each year: once in the Spring and once in the Fall. It's a great opportunity to discard unwanted items from your home.

### What can be picked up:


Items such as furniture, mattresses, boxes, bagged clothes, toys, bicycles without the tires, and grills without the propane tanks can be picked up.

### What cannot be picked up:

Items such as tires, electronics, appliances, paint, oils, batteries, gas and propane tanks, stumps, and construction materials cannot be picked up.

Please remember that your bulky items will only be picked up on the same day your solid waste is collected. Place bulky items to be collected on your curb this weekend. Items placed or left on the curb after November 7 will be subject to fines and citations.

# HURRICANE HELENE

This special section features information related to the storm, as well as the recovery and relief efforts that followed.

## **Storm Causes Extensive Damage**

Many communities in North Carolina experienced extensive damage due to the storm that occurred on Friday, September 27. Our area was impacted by flooding, fallen trees, downed power lines, and storm debris.



The storm caused widespread power outages across our area, and as a result, a number of City of Shelby electric customers were impacted by power outages.

City of Shelby crews from the Electric, Natural Gas, and Public Works Departments immediately responded to assess the damage, begin the process of restoring power to our customers, and clear roads that were blocked by downed trees and power lines.





We would like to express our gratitude to the **#PublicPower** agencies from the Town of Clayton, the City of Rocky Mount, the Town of Wake Forest, the City of High Point, and the City of Wilson for their assistance during our recovery efforts.





### **First Broad River Trail**



The First Broad River Trail has been temporarily closed to the public due to damage caused to the suspension bridge by the recent storm. A timeline for repair and re-opening of the trail has not yet been determined at this time. Monitor the First Broad River Trail page for updates.

### **Storm Debris Removal**



Due to the significant volume of debris to be removed following the storm, the City of Shelby has opted to participate in a prepositioned debris removal contract to be administered by Cleveland County.

These contracts are put in place by NC Emergency Management to properly procure and preposition disaster debris removal and monitoring that can be activated through the County in the event of a widespread local disaster.

Funding for these contracts is provided through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) reimbursement process. This Federal, State, and Local process should enable debris removal in a much more timely and efficient manner.

## **Assisting Western NC Communities**

In the aftermath of Hurricane Helene, teams from the City of Shelby's Fire and Rescue and Public Works Departments were deployed to assist with disaster relief efforts in Western North Carolina.

These efforts included operational support and humanitarian aid to areas that were devastated by the storm.



















### **Donated Items for Western North Carolina**

The City of Shelby's Police with Department partnered Road to Hope to collect donated supplies for Madison County Western North Carolina. fully loaded enclosed trailer with food, water, Gatorade, clothes, shoes, baby needs, paper products, and much more was delivered.







The City of Shelby's Fire and Rescue Department also delivered a fully loaded trailer of donated supplies to Buncombe County in Western North Carolina. In total, 8 pallets of Gatorade, 35 cases of toilet paper, 35 cases of paper towels, multiple boxes of diapers and baby wipes, boxes of non-perishable food, and many more items were delivered.



An industrial site on Randolph Road in Shelby became the headquarters for a partnership between the City of Shelby, Cleveland County, and United Way Cleveland County to collect and distribute humanitarian aid to our community as well as communities in Western North Carolina.

We would like to thank the many businesses, churches, organizations, agencies, individuals, groups, and families that donated much needed supplies for our community and Western North Carolina, and for the tireless work of all who volunteered to help at the donation site.
